# New "As of Right" Rules a First in Canada to Attract More Health Care Workers to Ontario

Changes will automatically recognize the credentials of health care workers registered in other provinces and territories

January 19, 2023

WINDSOR – With new "As of Right" rules, the Ontario government will allow health care workers registered in other provinces and territories to immediately start working and caring for people in Ontario.

"As we connect people to more convenient care, we need to be bold, innovative and creative," said Premier Doug Ford. "With our new "As of Right" rules, Ontario is the first province in Canada to allow health care workers from across the country to immediately start providing care. That's the kind of innovative solutions that will cut down unnecessary bureaucratic delays and help bring reinforcements to the frontlines of our health care system."

The government will introduce legislative changes in February 2023 that, if passed, will allow Canadian health care workers that are already registered or licensed in another Canadian jurisdiction to practice in Ontario immediately, without having to first register with one of Ontario's health regulatory colleges. These changes will help health-care workers overcome bureaucratic delays that have made it difficult to practice in Ontario.

"Our government is making health care more accessible for Ontarians, which means recruiting more health care professionals to bolster our health care system and making it easier for them to start working," said Sylvia Jones, Deputy Premier and Minister of Health. "A highly-skilled health care worker from British Columbia or Nova Scotia shouldn't have to pause their career or face barriers to practice here in Ontario."

In addition, Ontario will also be helping hospitals and other health organizations temporarily increase staffing when they need to fill vacancies or manage periods of high patient volume, such as during the COVID-19 pandemic. In February, the government will introduce legislation that, if passed, will increase staffing levels on

a short-term basis by allowing health care professionals, including nurses, paramedics, respiratory therapists, and others, to work outside of their regular responsibilities or settings, as long as they have the knowledge skill, and judgement to do so. This will provide hospitals and other settings with more flexibility to ensure health care professionals are filling the most in-demand roles at the right time.

As a part of the government's focus on making health care more convenient for Ontarians, the province is hiring more health care professionals to better connect Ontarians to the care they need, when and where they need it. This work is on top of other initiatives to recruit more health care workers, such as making it easier for internationally-educated nurses to join Ontario's workforce and investing to upskill nurses currently working in the province. As Ontario continues to expand its health workforce, patients can expect more services in their community, shorter wait times and greater access to high-quality care.

#### **Quick Facts**

- These changes, if passed, will mark the first step towards a pan-Canadian portable registration model, the first of its kind for health care professionals in Canada.
- Under this proposal, health care professionals from outside the province will
  only be eligible and permitted to work in Ontario if they have provided safe,
  competent, and ethical health care in their home province or territory.

- The Ontario government is expanding medical school education. Ontario is adding 160 undergraduate seats and 295 postgraduate positions over the next five years, the largest expansion of undergraduate and postgraduate education in over 10 years.

# Premier Doug Ford's Speech at the Rural Ontario Municipalities Association 2023

January 23, 2023

TORONTO — Premier Ford delivered the following remarks at the 2023 Rural Ontario Municipal Association conference.

"Well, good morning.

Thank you, Jeyan, for your introduction.

And thank you to the Rural Ontario Municipal Association and all its members for having me here today.

And isn't it great to be here, together in person, for the first time in two years.

Navigating the COVID-19 pandemic was a once-in-a-century challenge especially for small and rural communities.

I'm so proud of how Team Ontario responded.

From our heroes on the frontlines to every one of Ontario's 444 municipalities, we came together to keep our province safe.

I want to thank you all for the work you did and continue to do to help keep our communities safe and healthy.

As I've said before the small communities and townships of Ontario are the lifeblood of this province and our government will always have your backs.

Because we know that if our rural communities are successful and prosperous then all of Ontario is successful and prosperous.

My friends, our government has a plan that's building all of Ontario.

Whether you live in Downtown Toronto, Sudbury, Thunder Bay or Goderich and everywhere in between, we're making sure every inch of Ontario, every person and community benefits from our investments to support economic growth and protect jobs.

Our plan to build Ontario starts with building a stronger economy.

As you all know under the previous government, Ontario saw over 300,000 jobs vanish, as businesses fled to other jurisdictions.

Skyrocketing energy costs and over-regulation made it impossible for businesses here to compete.

They left in the thousands.

Each of you know best...how devastating it can be...on smaller towns and communities when companies leave.

Families struggle.

Other businesses are just as hurt.

But those days are over.

They're done.

We're making electricity more affordable and cutting red tape.

We've kept taxes and fees low.

And the result is we have reduced the cost of doing business in Ontario by sevenbillion dollars a year.

That's right. \$7 billion...with a B...each and every year.

And, since our government took office in 2018, we have created over 500,000 new jobs all over the province.

These jobs...these investments...that's money that goes back to the businesses in your community so they can invest in growth and create new jobs.

Our government is also revitalizing our auto sector helping to make Ontario an auto-manufacturing powerhouse once again.

We're securing billions of dollars in new investments including Honda's \$1.4 billion investment to retool its Alliston assembly plant and Stellantis and LG's historic, \$5 billion investment to build Canada's first ever electric vehicle battery plant.

I was thrilled to be on hand at General Motors last December in Ingersoll...

As the first full scale electric vehicle plant opened and trucks came off the production line.

But friends the real opportunity for Ontario...for all of Ontario...is realizing the full value of the electric vehicle supply chain.

From start to finish...from mining to manufacturing...we're going to build the cars of the future right here in Ontario, across Ontario.

Last year in Thunder Bay, I had the opportunity to stand shoulder to shoulder with some amazing miners as our government launched Ontario's first-ever critical minerals strategy.

A five-year roadmap to better connect the industries, resources and workers in our province's north to our manufacturers in the south.

We're also strengthening the manufacturing sectors in eastern and southwestern Ontario.

Through our Regional Development Program, we've invested more than \$70 million, since 2019 to help create more than 1,400 jobs.

And we're investing in our province's Agri-food sector with a goal to increase Ontario food production by 30 per cent over the next 10 years helping to ensure our province's food supply chain remains safe, strong and stable.

Another priority for our government is to find more ways to keep costs down for Ontario families.

Our government will always look for ways to put more money back in Ontarian's pockets.

We eliminated fees for license plate stickers.

And we cut the gas tax...a tax that impacts rural and remote communities most.

The cost of gas impacts every single product and service as trucks, trains and planes bring us the things we rely on.

Cutting the gas tax cuts the cost of these products and services.

It's never been more important to offer hard-working people a bit of relief.

And my friends, we can't talk about affordability, without talking about building homes.

As you know we are currently facing a housing crisis, decades in the making as previous governments refused to build the housing we needed.

With our population expected to grow by over 2 million over the next decade we need more homes, built faster.

That's why our government is taking bold action to build 1.5-million new homes across Ontario by 2031 including a mix of ownership and rental housing types that meet the needs of all Ontarians.

It's simple economics...it's supply and demand.

We need to work together, to build new homes to make home ownership more attainable for people.

This plan includes building more homes in every part of Ontario.

Ontario's small towns...our rural communities...they're also growing.

As they do, we want to make sure that people can continue to enjoy the beauty of... and set down roots in...Ontario's rural communities.

And as our communities grow, we know that our infrastructure needs to keep up.

That's why we're investing a historic \$86.6 billion over ten years to build and expand roads, highways, and transit infrastructure across Ontario.

And we're pleased to be supporting our Indigenous partners in communities around the ring of fire in their work to finally build an all-season roadway, not only to support development, but also improve access to every-day essentials like fuel, groceries and health care.

This year through the Ontario Community Infrastructure Fund, we're providing \$400 million to 425 small, rural and northern communities to renew and rehabilitate critical infrastructure including roads, bridges, water and wastewater projects.

Another critical piece of infrastructure that has been long ignored is connecting all Ontarians to modern broadband internet.

When I speak to people in Toronto, some are shocked to learn that not everyone in our province has access to high-speed internet.

We need to fix that...and we are.

As part of our nearly \$4 billion, multi-year investment, we're bringing reliable high-speed internet access to every region in Ontario by the end of 2025.

And finally, I want to speak briefly about health care infrastructure and how we're connecting all Ontarians including those who live in rural communities to more convenient care closer to home.

I know our all-star Deputy Premier and Health Minister is up next and I'll let her speak about specific initiatives.

But I do want to say that our government is making historic investments in health care.

We are adding 3,000 more hospital beds, across the province with 50 major hospital infrastructure projects under way including many outside of major cities like Bracebridge and Huntsville, Collingwood, Brant and Grand River to name just a few.

People who live in more rural and remote parts of Ontario deserve to receive care in modern, state-of-the-art hospitals just like anyone else.

And as we build new hospitals, we're expanding Ontario's health care workforce with increased funding to recruit, retain, and train nurses and other staff including for our rural and remote communities where hiring health care workers has always been more difficult.

Last week, Minister Jones, Minister Dunlop and I unveiled our plans to expand the popular Learn and Stay grant.

This grant pays for the full cost of tuition, books and other supplies for students in high-demand fields including nurses, paramedics, and lab-techs, in return for agreeing to work in underserviced areas of the province including our rural and remote communities.

And we're making it easier, faster, and more convenient for Ontarians everywhere to access quality care, close to home.

My friends, our government is creating the conditions for jobs to grow and businesses to succeed.

We're working to make life more affordable for Ontarians.

And, to keep in line with the theme of this year's conference, we're breaking new ground on new homes and new infrastructure projects in every community in this province.

From North Bay to Palmerston to Owen Sound and everywhere in between.

But...as we navigate global economic uncertainty...we know there is more to do.

We must stay focused and we can't take anything for granted.

I look forward to working with all of you to build a stronger Ontario and to make sure that every community in Ontario is the best place to live, work and raise a family.

Thank you...enjoy the rest of this conference.

## **Building All of Ontario**

Government's investments supporting economic growth, protecting jobs and building infrastructure in rural communities

January 24, 2023

**Municipal Affairs and Housing** 

TORONTO — The Ontario government is working with its rural municipal partners to build housing, encourage economic growth and development, reduce red tape, strengthen the agri-food sector and promote rural municipalities as great places to live, work and do business.

"Our government has a plan that's building all of Ontario," said Premier Doug Ford. "No matter the size of your community or where you live, we're making sure every inch of Ontario benefits from our investments to support economic growth and protect jobs, including by building infrastructure in rural communities. We want every part of Ontario to be the best place to live, work and raise a family."

During the Rural Ontario Municipal Association (ROMA) conference, Steve Clark, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing, announced that the government is providing more than \$936 million in much-needed funds to municipal service managers and Indigenous program administrators in 2023-24 and 2024-25 through initiatives under the National Housing Strategy to maintain and create more community housing. This includes an increase of over \$23 million in funding under the Canada-Ontario Housing Benefit for women and children fleeing violence. These funds are the result of Ontario's ongoing advocacy and recent negotiations with the federal government to help ensure our partners in the housing sector have the resources needed to protect, renew and expand community housing across the province.

Minister Clark also announced the province is extending the deadline for implementation projects approved under Intake 3 of the Municipal Modernization Program (MMP) to streamline, digitize and modernize their services, including managing and approving applications for residential developments. Ontario is also extending the deadline for final reports for projects under the Streamline Development Approval Fund.

"Rural communities are the backbone of Ontario's success and key to the province's economy," said Minister Clark. "Our government sees a bright future for rural Ontario with opportunities for growth, enhanced education and training, and increased workforce productivity – all while providing a high quality of life and housing options that Ontario families can afford."

Lisa Thompson, Minister of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs also announced the launch of a new intake of the Rural Economic Development (RED) program. The RED program supports projects that help increase economic opportunities, create and retain jobs, and support the economic growth and resilience of rural and Indigenous communities. Applications for the new RED intake will be accepted until February 23, 2023. This program aligns with the government's priorities of removing barriers to investment, opening doors to rural economic development and creating good jobs across the province.

The ROMA conference is an important opportunity for provincial and municipal leaders to discuss and collaborate on rural priorities. This year's conference was held in-person in Toronto for the first time since 2020, and rural municipal officials had an opportunity to interact face-to-face with Ministers, Associate Ministers and Parliamentary Assistants. They exchanged ideas, discussed opportunities and identified ways to address some of the key priorities facing rural municipalities today, including increasing housing supply, strengthening local infrastructure, tackling homelessness, improving mental health supports, economic development and more.

"Our government is focused on a robust approach to promoting economic development across the North and we are supporting rural businesses as they look to grow their operations and workforces."

"Rural Ontario is full of untapped potential. ROMA has spent the past two years exploring ways to ensure rural municipalities recover from the pandemic and realize their promise," said ROMA Chair and Mayor of the Village of Westport, Robin Jones. "We thank the Ontario Government for participating in the ROMA conference and we look forward to partnering to find creative solutions that will strengthen our communities for a more prosperous Ontario where no one is left behind."

- The National Housing Strategy (NHS) bilateral agreement between Ontario and Canada provides more than \$5.75 billion over nine years to protect, renew and expand community housing and deliver direct affordability support to Ontarians in need of housing.
- The Ontario government has invested nearly \$4.4 billion over the past three years to grow and enhance community and supportive housing, respond to COVID-19 and address homelessness for vulnerable Ontarians including over \$1.2 billion to service managers and Indigenous program administrators through the Social Services Relief Fund.

# Ontario Expanding Mental Health Services for Children and Youth in Every Corner of the Province

"One Stop Talk" program connects youth to mental health counselling by phone, video, text and chat

WHITBY — The Ontario government is investing \$4.75 million to expand the "One Stop Talk" virtual "walk-in" counselling program to connect children, youth and their families with more convenient and timely ways to access mental health counselling no matter where they live.

"Our government is making it easier and more convenient for children and youth in every corner of the province to access mental health care," said Sylvia Jones, Deputy Premier and Minister of Health. "This program offers modern, convenient options for youth to connect to help in ways that they're used to communicating."

The "One Stop Talk" service offers convenient ways to talk to a clinician by phone, video conference, text and chat without an appointment. The program began as a pilot in November 2022 with six participating mental health organizations and is now being expanded to additional organizations and their waitlisted patients. When fully implemented, the program will eventually be available to all children, youth and their families.

The government is also significantly expanding the number of <u>Youth Wellness Hubs</u> across the province to make it faster and easier for young people to connect to mental health and substance use support, primary care, social services, and more. Through the <u>Addictions Recovery Fund</u>, the government is adding eight new youth wellness hubs to the 14 that were created since 2020, bringing the total to 22 across the province.

These hubs help fill the gap in youth addictions services and also provide children and youth aged 12 to 25 a range of other services, such as vocational support, education services, housing and recreation and wellness.

"Through our *Roadmap to Wellness*, we are focused on fixing our complicated and disjointed mental health and addictions care system once and for all," said Michael Tibollo, Associate Minister of Mental Health and Addictions. "Significantly expanding our network of Youth Wellness Hubs is one more way we're creating a system where Ontarians of all ages have convenient access to the highest-quality mental health and addictions supports, when and where they need them."

Ontario's <u>Roadmap to Wellness</u> plan – the province's mental health and addictions strategy – has so far provided \$525 million to use innovative solutions to improve the quality and access to mental health supports while shortening wait times and removing gaps in service. The plan is built on four central pillars – improving quality, expanding existing services, implementing innovative solutions and improving access – that are designed to work together to support the delivery of the services people need, where and when they need them.

- The eight new Youth Wellness Hubs will be in Algoma Region, Kingston Frontenac Lennox and Addington, London-Middlesex, Sagamok Anishnabek First Nation, Sarnia-Lambton, Sudbury, Thorncliffe Park, and West Toronto.
- One of these new Youth Wellness Hubs will be located at Sagamok Anishnabek
  First Nation and will offer culturally safe and appropriate primary care, mental
  health and addictions services to Indigenous youth in and around that
  community
- Ontario's mental health and addictions strategy, <u>Roadmap to Wellness</u>, was released in March 2020. It sets out a vision for an Ontario where everyone has access to high quality mental health and addictions treatment and support, when and where they need it.
- The <u>Roadmap</u> was developed from the ground up, based on conversations with Ontarians.
- Once fully implemented, the One Stop Talk service will provide immediate, low barrier access to brief counselling services through a single virtual access point from anywhere in the province.

# Ontario Connecting Long-Term Care Home Residents to More Diagnostic Services

Two new pilot projects will connect residents with faster, convenient access to diagnostic services

January 31, 2023

<u>Long-Term Care</u> <u>Health</u>

TORONTO — The Ontario government is connecting long-term care residents to faster and convenient access to diagnostic services such as x-rays and ultrasounds. Improved access to care will help improve residents' quality of life and reduce avoidable emergency department visits or hospital stays.

"Ontario is fixing long-term care so that every resident experiences the best possible quality of life, supported by safe, high-quality care," said Paul Calandra, Minister of Long-Term Care. "By providing faster and more convenient access to diagnostic services, we will reduce the number of avoidable emergency department visits and in-patient hospital admissions, helping long-term care residents live happier and healthier lives."

To start, the province is partnering on pilot projects with Humber River Hospital in Toronto and Royal Victoria Regional Health Centre in Barrie to increase access to more diagnostic services for long-term care residents, including assessment, diagnostic testing and timely interpretation of their results.

Enhanced services offered through Humber River Hospital will include:

- Increasing the number of hours for pre-booked appointments for x-ray and ultrasound services;
- Non-urgent resident transport for x-ray and ultrasound services at Humber River Hospital; and
- Increasing the number of hours a long-term care home can connect with a nurse navigator that supports long-term care homes with needs assessments and coordinating with other health care teams.

Enhanced services offered through the Royal Victoria Regional Health Centre will include:

- Increasing access to x-ray services for long-term care residents who fall and require a non-urgent x-ray;
- Access to a nurse navigator at the hospital to support the long-term care resident to navigate services; and
- Non-urgent resident transport for x-ray services at Royal Victoria Regional Health Centre.

As a next step, the province will work with partners such as hospitals and community labs on a broader provincial plan to provide faster and more convenient access to care for all long-term care residents across Ontario. This may include finding creative and innovative ways to connect residents with services inside their long-term care home, instead of travelling to a hospital or clinic.

"Our government believes in the importance of being able to connect to high-quality care that people expect, closer to home," said Sylvia Jones, Deputy Premier and Minister of Health. "These investments will ensure long-term care residents can maintain their quality of life, spend more time in their community with loved ones, and avoid unnecessary trips to the hospital."

As part of its plan to fix long-term care, the province is also making significant investments in specialized services for residents with complex needs, building nearly 60,000 much-needed new and upgraded long-term care beds in the province by 2028, and strengthening staffing to reach our legislated goal of providing an average of four hours of direct care per resident per day by 2025.

#### **Quick Facts**

- The province will initially invest \$350,000 and \$1,875,000 annually over the next two years in the two initiatives announced today.
- The Ontario government is making significant investments in specialized services and supports for long-term care residents with complex needs like bariatric, behavioural and dialysis, so they can get the care they need while avoiding unnecessary hospitalization. This includes a \$20 million investment in 2022-23 for a new Long-Term Care Local Priorities Fund to be administered by Ontario Health, an additional \$5 million for Behavioural Supports Ontario (BSO), \$2.6 million for the Baycrest Virtual Behaviour Medicine program, \$4.5 million in one-time funding for a new, 56-unit, mixed-market seniors' housing complex in Kenora, and \$5.91 million to create four new Behavioural Specialized Units at long-term care homes in Ajax, Penetanguishene and Scarborough.

Through a \$6.4 billion investment, Ontario has 31,705 new and 28,648
upgraded beds in the planning, construction and opening stages of the
development process. This will help increase overall bed capacity, address longterm care waitlists and hallway health care, and provide our seniors the care
they deserve.

Renfrew County's own Melissa Bishop-Nriagu has been named the Ambassador for the Renfrew County 2023 Ontario Winter Games as she aims to inspire the next generation of local athletes.

Born and raised in the Ottawa Valley, Bishop-Nriagu hails from Eganville and is a three-time Olympian in Track and Field in the 800-metre event. She competed at the 2012, 2016 (finishing fourth) and 2020 Summer Olympics and won a silver medal at the 2015 World Championships. The silver medal win was the first ever medal in the 800m by a Canadian woman and she currently holds the Canadian record in the 800m.

Bishop-Nriagu graduated from the University of Windsor with degrees in Human Kinetics and Education. She also competed in the Ontario Summer Games in 2009 and knows first-hand the excitement, development and fun to be had over the course of these Games.

The three-time Olympian will be addressing the athletes during both outdoor Opening Ceremonies February 2 and February 9 at Ma-te-Way Park in Renfrew. Her message to the athletes at the Games is to compete well, but also to have fun with a smile on their faces and to create memories that will last a lifetime.

"I am so thrilled our community gets to host the Ontario Winter Games this year, growing up I had no idea that I would be a role model in my community but as I take on this role, I understand how important it is for our youth to see that anybody can make it on the world stage," said Bishop-Nriagu. "You too can have big dreams, come from a small community, like Renfrew County, and make it. Just remember to be ambitious and be persistent with what your dreams are."

Renfrew County Warden Peter Emon, Chair of the Games Organizing Committee, is extremely excited to have Bishop-Nriagu serve as the 2023 Ontario Winter Games Ambassador.

"Melissa has such a compelling story of dedication and hard work which will resonate with many of our young athletes coming to Renfrew County and with our friends, families and neighbours," said Emon. "Her success as an athlete and her genuineness as a person has been an ongoing point of community and individual pride for many of us."

Emon believes Bishop-Nriagu is an excellent example of the Ontario Winter Games' values.

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## Snowboard withdraws from Renfrew County 2023 Ontario Winter Games

The Provincial Sport Organization for Snowboard has withdrawn from the Renfrew County 2023 Ontario Winter Games.

Unfortunately, the Snowboard venue for Ontario Winter Games, Calabogie Peaks Ski Resort, experienced a fire on January 3 which destroyed the pump house and damaged snow making equipment beyond immediate repair.

While the venue operator has been working on a variety of solutions, Games Ontario and the Games Organizing Committee were notified January 19 that replacement parts would not arrive and be operational on time to guarantee a quality course could be constructed in time for the Games.

"This is really unfortunate for these athletes, but circumstances are out of our control," said Games Manager Cindy Burwell. "We regret this outcome and will be communicating further in the coming weeks about a plan to award Ontario Winter Games medals at alternate snowboard events later this season."

The third day of the Alpine competition, taking place at Calabogie Peaks the second weekend of the Games, has also been cancelled.

The Renfrew County 2023 Ontario Winter Games are being hosted by the County of Renfrew February 2-5 and February 9-12. The Games will feature 22 different sports with approximately 2,300 athletes ranging in age from 11-20, participating in both ablebodied and para-sports.

Medal winners at the Renfrew County 2023 Ontario Winter Games will be going home with a little piece of Renfrew County.

The Games medals were inspired by the forestry industry, which is a key part of the heritage of Renfrew County and a major player in the local economy.

"We are really pleased with the medals, which were handcrafted by an independent jeweller and are inspired by the forests of our region, while reinforcing the important values of the Games," said Cindy Burwell, Games Manager.

The medals were designed by Erin Mask, a graphic artist from Madawaska Valley, with the Ontario Winter Games logo and coniferous trees, indigenous to our area, on the front of the medals and the County of Renfrew logo and the Games' Values on the back. The medals were fabricated by a small Ontario jeweller, Personal Illusion Jewelers. "I would say that the clean, simple image of the trees on the front of the medal represents, to me, the best our area has to offer – industry, space, beauty and abundant opportunities to enjoy the great outdoors," said Mask. "We are privileged to live here."

Mask's family moved from Toronto to Barry's Bay when she was just eight years old, after they visited a cottage on Kaminiskeg Lake for a few summers and decided to trade the city life in for the rural beauty and pace of the Madawaska Valley. She went to George Brown College for Graphic Design and Advertising, returned to the Madawaska Valley and came back to the Valley to raise her family 12 years later. She works full time with the Renfrew County District School board and does freelance graphic design work on the side.

"I hope the medals remind the visiting athletes of their great accomplishments here in Renfrew County surrounded by vast beauty and opportunities that will draw them back to visit often," added Mask. "I am thankful for the opportunity to contribute to this great event!"

The medal ribbon colours also have special meaning; on the gold medal is red which represents "inspiration" and Team Ontario's official colour; the silver medal ribbon is blue, which represents "community" and green ribbon for the bronze medal represents "opportunity".

An important part of these Renfrew County Games are the Games' Values, sponsored by Canadian Nuclear Laboratories (CNL). CNL has long served as a major employer in Renfrew County, and as a trusted and reliable partner to local communities and businesses. The Games have adopted CNL's core values and seek to abide by these values and share them with all participants. The six core values encompass the back of the medal, surrounding the Renfrew County logo in the centre: Safety, Integrity, Respect, Teamwork, Accountability and Excellence.

### A Call for Provincial Action on Property Assessments

Policy Update • January 16, 2023

Property assessments are typically updated every four years. This process was paused during the height of the pandemic to help municipal governments focus on responding to COVID-19.

Through <u>recent correspondence and engagement with the Ministry of Finance</u>, AMO has expressed very strong support for a timely return to the assessment cycle.

The province's latest economic statement was silent on the assessment cycle, leaving the sector eager to understand the government's intentions regarding the 2024 tax year and beyond.

With the ROMA conference now just over a week away, AMO continues to call on the government for urgent action. We encourage members to re-iterate the following messages to their local MPPs and during discussions with the province at ROMA:

- Municipal governments recognize how important it was to pause the planned 2020 reassessment during the height of the pandemic.
- Municipalities are now eager to hear that the government will authorize the reassessment without further delay and in time for the 2024 tax year.
- Municipalities and property taxpayers understand the necessity of a modern, up-to-date, and reliable assessment system.
- The system provides stability and predictability for municipalities and for residential and commercial property taxpayers.
- A well-functioning, up-to-date assessment system is the foundation of the municipal tax system that supports strong, vibrant, and growing communities.

### ROMA 2023 Conference, Federal Disaster Mitigation and Adaptation Fund, RED Funding Intake Open

Policy Update • January 24, 2023

### **ROMA 2023 Conference**

Over the past three days, more than 1500 delegates from across Ontario gathered at the first in-person Rural Ontario Municipal Association (ROMA) conference since 2020. The conference is an important annual event in Ontario's public policy calendar.

Housing and infrastructure remain at the forefront of the provincial-municipal relationship and featured prominently at the conference:

- ROMA chair Robin Jones <u>highlighted</u> the need for provincial-municipal collaboration, and a plan that goes beyond municipal planning and approvals to focus on expanding municipal infrastructure and services and removing provincial policy barriers.
- AMO President Colin Best <u>called for the province</u> to fully offset financial impacts of Bill 23 on municipalities, work in partnership with municipalities, and course correct where necessary.
- Premier Doug Ford and Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing Steve Clark spoke to the importance of working collaboratively with municipalities to build affordable housing and acknowledged the need for investments in municipal infrastructure. Minister Clark signaled an openness to innovative solutions from municipalities to implement Bill 23 and inform future legislation.

Municipal representatives highlighted the need for urgent provincial action on homelessness as part of the housing crisis:

- A commitment to improving mental health and addictions services and expanding community and supportive housing was highlighted both by a mainstage panel on rural housing and homelessness, to be broadcast on TVO's The Agenda, and by Minister of Health Sylvia Jones as part of the Ministers' Forum.
- Minister Clark announced Ontario's 2023-24 and 2024-25 allocation under the federal-provincial National Housing Strategy, totalling \$936 million. This includes an additional allocation of \$23 million for the Canada-Ontario Housing Benefit.

Other areas of focus included property assessment, Indigenous relations, energy, waste management, and railway crossings and drainage:

- AMO President Colin Best highlighted the need to proceed with re-assessment to ensure a stable and predictable property tax system.
- Mississaugas of the Credit Chief Stacey Laforme, former ROMA Chair and mayor Allan Thompson, and Indigenous advocate and broadcaster Jesse Wente all talked about the role of truth and reconciliation at the municipal level.
- Minister of Energy Todd Smith, the Independent Electricity System Operator and others
  highlighted the critical role of municipal councils in the future of Ontario's energy system, and the
  need for them to be <u>informed</u> and prepared.
- Minister of Environment, Conservation and Parks David Piccini highlighted the need for an onschedule Blue Box transition to full producer responsibility.
- Minister of Agriculture and Rural Affairs Lisa Thompson and Minister Clark recognized the impact on municipalities of railways failing to pay for crossing and drainage costs and committed to action.

### Intake Open for New Projects Through Disaster Mitigation and Adaptation Fund

The Government of Canada is accepting applications until July 19, 2023 for new construction and infrastructure projects through the Disaster Mitigation and Adaptation Fund.

Eligible projects must have a minimum total cost of \$1 million and include new public infrastructure or the modification of existing public infrastructure that will help communities withstand natural disasters and climate-related risks.

Municipal, local, provincial or territory governments, public sector bodies, Indigenous organizations, not-for-profits or for-profit organizations in partnership with eligible applicants outside the private sector are all eligible to apply for the more than \$1 billion available in the fund for eligible projects.

AMO has been advocating for an extension of the fund on behalf of Ontario municipalities and is pleased to see the new intake open. Interested applicants can click <u>here</u> for more information.

### **New Rural Economic Development Program Intake Now Open**



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

### Canada's New Guidance on Alcohol and Health

On Tuesday, January 17, the Canadian Centre on Substance Use and Addiction (CCSA) released Canada's Guidance on Alcohol and Health, replacing the 2011 Low-Risk Alcohol Drinking Guidelines (LRDGs).

Canada's Guidance on Alcohol and Health is based on a scale showing a greater risk of harm with the more alcohol that a person consumes. The new guidance states that consuming more than 2 standard drinks per occasion is associated with an increased risk of alcohol-related harms to oneself and others. It is a decrease in low-risk consumption from the previous LRDGs.

"The main take-away from the new guidelines is that less is better," states Dr. Ian Gemmill, Acting Medical Officer of Health, Renfrew County and District Health Unit.

Key points from the guidance include:

- **O drinks per week** Not drinking has benefits, such as better health and better sleep.
- **2 standard drinks or less per week** People are likely to avoid alcohol-related consequences for oneself or others at this level.
- **3 to 6 standard drinks per week** The risk of developing several types of cancer, including breast and colon cancer, increases at this level.
- **7 standard drink or more per week** The risk of heart disease or stroke increases significantly at this level.
- **Each additional standard drink** Radically increases the risk of alcohol-related consequences.

### A standard drink means:

- 341 ml or 12 oz of beer at 5% alcohol,
- 341 ml or 12 oz of **cooler, cider, or ready-to-drink, drinks** at 5% alcohol,
- 142 ml or 5 oz of wine at 12% alcohol, or
- 43 ml or 1.5 oz of spirits (such as whisky, vodka, gin, etc.) at 40% alcohol.


We're a busy destination in Arnprior and we wish to thank volunteers who help to make things happen!
