Ontario Applies 25 Per Cent Surcharge on Electricity Exports to United States

Surcharge part of initial retaliatory measures that will remain in place until U.S. tariffs are removed for good

March 10, 2025

Office of the Premier

TORONTO — Effective today, the Ontario government has applied a 25 per cent surcharge on all electricity exports to the United States as part of the province's initial suite of retaliatory measures to U.S. tariffs on Canada. This surcharge will affect 1.5 million homes and businesses in Michigan, Minnesota and New York, costing up to \$400,000 every day the surcharge remains in place.

"President Trump's tariffs are a disaster for the U.S. economy. They're making life more expensive for American families and businesses," said Premier Doug Ford. "Until the threat of tariffs is gone for good, Ontario won't back down. We'll stand strong, use every tool in our toolkit and do whatever it takes to protect Ontario."

Starting today, <u>new market rules are in effect</u> that require any generator selling electricity to the U.S. to add a 25 per cent surcharge valued at \$10 per megawatt-hour (Mwh) to the cost of power. At this level, the surcharge will generate revenue of \$300,000 to \$400,000 per day, which will be used to support Ontario workers, families and businesses.

The government will use every tool at its disposal to protect Ontario workers and families from President Trump's tariffs, including increasing this surcharge at any time or, if the U.S. escalates, cutting off electricity exports to the U.S. completely.

"For decades, Ontario has powered American homes, factories, offices and jobs, and we will not stand by as our vital electricity exports are taken for granted," said Stephen Lecce, Minister of Energy and Electrification. "In a time where prices are going up for families in America, Canada and the United States should be working together to strengthen our trade and investment relationships to ensure a prosperous future for both sides of the border."

The new surcharge is in addition to the Government of Canada imposing an initial round of \$30 billion in retaliatory tariffs. In Ontario, LCBO, the largest buyer of alcohol in the world, has removed all United States products from its shelves, costing American producers \$1 billion in lost revenue. Ontario has also banned U.S. companies from participating in an estimated \$30 billion worth of annual government procurement.

Quick Facts

- Ontario currently exports electricity generated across the province directly to Michigan, New York and Minnesota.
- Between 2021 and 2023, Ontario exported 14.6, 14.2 and 12.0 terawatt hours of electricity to the United States.
- Ontario has 26 transmission connections with neighbouring jurisdictions: 11 with Quebec, three with Manitoba, one with Minnesota, four with Michigan and seven with New York.

Inspection of 2025 – 2026 Annual Work Schedule - Algonquin Park Forest



Renfrew County and District Health Unit Is Encouraging Residents to Ensure Their Measles Vaccinations Are Up to Date and Be Aware of Measles Symptoms

Ontario is experiencing a measles outbreak involving 177 cases as of February 26, 2025. Most outbreak cases have been reported in Southwestern Ontario by Southwestern Public Health and Grand Erie Public Health. Over 90% of infections have been in unimmunized individuals. At this time, no cases of measles have been reported in Renfrew County and District.

"The increase in measles infections across Ontario is concerning. I strongly recommend that everyone check their immunization status and ensure they are up to date, which is the most effective thing we can do to prevent the spread of infection in our region," said Dr. Jason Morgenstern, Medical Officer of Health at the Renfrew County and District Health Unit.

Measles is a highly contagious viral infection with symptoms of fever, cough, runny nose, red eyes, fatigue, and red rash. Symptoms usually appear 7 to 21 days after being exposed to the virus. Measles can cause serious health problems, including hospitalization, pneumonia, inflammation of the brain, and, rarely, death. The virus can spread quickly from person to person by direct contact and through small respiratory droplets in the air.

How do I know if my measles vaccinations are up to date?

- Most people born before 1970 have protection (immunity) due to infection in their childhood, as high levels of measles were circulating before 1970.
- Anyone born in 1970 or later who has not had 2 doses of MMR or been infected with measles is vulnerable to infection.
- Southwestern Ontario is currently experiencing high levels of measles circulation. There are special immunization recommendations for people traveling to the area.
- Visit <u>RCDHU's website</u> or call RCDHU at 613-732-9436 or 1-833-773-0004 for detailed information about measles immunization.

You can access immunization records using the <u>ICON</u> tool. If your record is not up to date, speak to your health-care provider about getting your vaccines. RCDHU also offers vaccine clinics by appointment. For more information, or to book an appointment at an RCDHU clinic, call 613-732-9436 or 1-833-773-0004.

If you experience any symptoms of measles, please **call your health-care provider and avoid attending any public settings**. If you need to go to a clinic or other healthcare setting for care, it is important to **contact them ahead of time to avoid spreading the virus to others**.

If you believe you have been in contact with the measles virus it is recommended that you:

- Wear a well-fitting mask (preferably N95/KN95 style)
- Limit unnecessary contact with others
- Monitor closely for symptoms







AMO Policy Update – Continued AMO Action on Trade and Tariffs

Investments in Community Housing as a Response to Tariffs

The introduction of US tariffs has already begun disrupting Ontario's economy. While we all remain hopeful for a resolution that avoids a negative impact on our communities, residents and industries, we must consider how to best to weather a potentially extended economic downturn.

Last week, <u>AMO wrote to the Premier</u> highlighting how investments in municipal infrastructure could protect vital construction jobs while driving future productivity. Today, AMO wrote a <u>follow-up letter</u> to share a <u>new report</u> that builds the business case for investments in community housing as a response to tariffs.

Investments in community housing have been an important element to past responses to economic downturns. These investments can both provide a secure pipeline of projects for the residential construction sector and contribute to Ontario's long-term productivity.

AMO is calling for an immediate new investment of \$1.5 billion over 2025/26 and 2026/27 for new capital development, capital repairs to existing stock, and acquisition and rehabilitation of existing buildings to protect Ontario. These investments would protect jobs in the residential construction sector

while supporting increased productivity and economic growth. This would help Ontario's residents, communities, and industry leave this time of uncertainty even stronger and more economically resilient.

In addition to this report, AMO is developing other resources to help municipalities chart an informed path through these uncertain times. We have released a number of data requests in the past weeks to support these efforts and would like to thank every municipality for their contributions to this united effort.

Re: Impacts of Tariffs

Please be advised the Council of the Municipality of Chatham-Kent, at its special meeting held on March 6, 2025, supported the following resolution regarding the above noted matter:

Whereas Canada is facing an unfair trade war based on tariffs from the Trump administration:

And Whereas tariffs have the prospect of negatively impacting our citizens, businesses, and community organizations;

And Whereas Chatham-Kent Council is ready and prepared to stand up for our businesses and citizens, and to support Team Canada in this fight;

And Whereas the approaches taken to respond to tariffs need to consider all potential impacts of the decision, including unintended consequences;

And Whereas Council strenuously objects to the ongoing attempts to undermine Canadian sovereignty by the Trump Administration;

And Whereas Council encourages the Federal government to continue work toward negotiations on ending this Trade War;

Therefore, Chatham-Kent Municipal Council directs administration to continue its work to address the impacts of this trade war, to immediately work on the following list of actions, and to work on any other matters that could be relevant to address the impact of these unfair tariffs:

- 1. Administration continue its work on addressing tariff impacts, including the review of:
 - a. Approaches taken by other municipalities to ensure Chatham-Kent is adopting best practices;
 - b. Supply chains for major purchases and products that may be impacted by tariffs;

- c. Legal options for adjusting contracts and procurement processes to reduce Chatham-Kent exposure to tariffs;
- d. Employment and support services for citizens whose jobs may be impacted by tariffs:
- e. Opportunities to advance major projects to assist in economic stimulus;
- 2. Economic Development continue to:
 - a. Connect with local businesses to understand impacts that tariffs are having;
 - b. Enhance existing Buy Local campaigns to help support local businesses and provide citizens with information about their purchasing decisions;
 - c. Be prepared to assist businesses with accessing senior government programs that may become available.
- 3. Administration be directed to support upper levels of government's "Team Canada" approach, including participating in municipal association work, and preparing advocacy to senior levels of government to address any barriers Chatham-Kent faces, and to advance the needs of our local companies;
- 4. Administration continue to update the www.Chatham-Kent.ca/TariffSupport webpage to keep citizens updated on the impacts of tariffs and relief programs that become available:
- 5. Administration report to the Mayor and Council regarding any opportunities for political collaboration between Chatham-Kent and other municipalities, municipal associations and cross-border initiatives;
- 6. Administration return to Council for any necessary funding requests and with updates on progress on each of the items in this motion.
- 7. Administration be directed to send a letter to the Federal and Provincial Governments to consider all means to decrease costs to Canadians.
- 8. Administration be directed to share this resolution with local MP's, MPP's, AMO, FCM, ROMA, OBCM, Border Mayor Alliance and all Ontario Municipalities.

Re: Motion to Request Landlord Tenant Reforms

At its Regular Meeting of Council held on Tuesday, March 4, 2025, the Town of Bradford West Gwillimbury Council approved the following resolution:

Resolution 2025-79

Moved: Councillor Giordano Seconded: Councillor Dykie

WHEREAS Ontario has expanded the accessory dwelling unit (ADU) framework to address the housing supply crisis, which includes the need to balance the interests of both tenants and small-scale landlords;

WHEREAS small-scale landlords may face financial strain when tenants withhold rent in bad faith, and delayed dispute resolution systems can result in undue hardship for landlords, while also affecting tenants' security and well-being;

WHEREAS it is crucial to support the development of legal ADUs and secondary rentals while ensuring tenants' rights are respected and upheld;

WHEREAS proposed reforms could include:

- Accelerating dispute resolution for ADUs and secondary rentals at the Landlord and Tenant Board (LTB) within 30 days, ensuring fairness for both tenants and landlords
- Introducing mediation services to resolve disputes quickly and amicably, reducing reliance on lengthy hearings
- Providing both landlords and tenants with enhanced tools for clear communication, such as standardized rental agreements and better screening practices

- Strengthening protections for tenants against unfair eviction while enforcing stricter penalties for tenants withholding rent in bad faith
- Ensuring law enforcement access to properties only under appropriate circumstances, respecting tenants' rights while supporting landlords in the resolution of unpaid rent issues
- Establishing a hardship relief fund for landlords impacted by unpaid rent, while ensuring tenants are also supported in cases of financial distress
- Offering free or low-cost legal assistance to both landlords and tenants to navigate disputes fairly.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Town of Bradford West Gwillimbury Council requests the provincial government to look at ways to implement these balanced reforms that protect both small-scale landlords and tenants, ensuring fairness in the rental market: and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to Premier Doug Ford, our local Member of Provincial Parliament, President of the Association of Municipalities of Ontario, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing, Attorney General, and all Ontario municipalities to support the creation of balanced protections for both landlords and tenants
