Ontario Investing in Agri-Food Research to Help Farmers and Agribusinesses Compete Globally

\$5.4 million investment in 28 new research projects will help Ontario's agri-food sector grow, innovate and boost competitiveness in the face of U.S. tariffs

TORONTO — Ontario is investing over \$5.4 million in 28 agri-food projects through the [Ontario Agri-Food Innovation Alliance](#) to help businesses commercialize new, cutting-edge research for Ontario's \$51 billion agri-food industry. As part of the government's plan to protect Ontario, these transformational research projects will lead to new discoveries and innovations that can help businesses grow, create jobs and boost their competitive advantage in the face of economic uncertainty from U.S. tariffs.

"Our government's strategic investments into transformative agri-food research is empowering Ontario's producers and innovators to turn world-class research into real-world solutions," said Trevor Jones, Minister of Agriculture, Food and Agribusiness. "By helping our farmers and agribusinesses innovate, create local jobs and compete globally, we're ensuring that our rural communities continue to thrive in the face of economic uncertainty."

Today's \$5.4 million investment is part of government's \$40 million investment over six years into the Ontario Agri-Food Innovation Alliance's tier 1 research programming. [Examples of projects supported by the Alliance](#) this year include:

- using economic data to help farmers and businesses respond to market changes and explore new trade opportunities
- developing a battery-powered, AI-driven robot to manage pests in soybean fields
- creating healthier beehives using advanced technology to protect honeybee colonies from Varroa mites
- helping farmers lower costs by developing nutrition and production management strategies for pigs

The Ontario Agri-Food Innovation Alliance supports agri-food research and innovation projects through a competitive process on an annual basis. Today's investment will help achieve the government's [Grow Ontario Strategy](#) goals of increasing agri-food innovation and adoption by working closely with our industry partners, agribusinesses and research organizations.

As part of the government’s plan to protect Ontario, Ontario recently announced \$9.2 million in grants and funding to support Indigenous-led economic development projects that build lasting prosperity, on and off reserve. The projects are receiving support through three initiatives: the Indigenous Community Capital Grants Program, and the Indigenous Economic Development Fund’s Economic Diversification and Regional Partnership grants.

Province Investing \$10 Million to Help Ontario Corps Protect Ontario

Funding and additional partner organizations will improve province's emergency response capabilities

TORONTO — The Ontario government is investing \$10 million in emergency preparedness grants to strengthen the response capabilities of Ontario Corps partners around the province and ensure they can get boots on the ground quickly in case of an emergency. This funding is part of the government's plan to protect Ontario by ensuring communities are better prepared to respond to local emergencies and have critical resources like debris removal tools and machinery, flood barriers and drones deployed at a moment's notice.

"Under the leadership of Premier Ford, our government is protecting Ontario from all threats – from wildland fires to flooding, ice storms or whatever else may come our way," said Jill Dunlop, Minister of Emergency Preparedness and Response.

"With 13 participating Ontario Corps partners so far, we're investing in made-in-Ontario solutions to support local emergency responders as soon as we're needed."

The province is also welcoming [13 partner organizations](#) to Ontario Corps, with more expected to join. Partners include: Attachment and Trauma Treatment Centre for Healing (ATTCH) Niagara, Feed Ontario, GlobalMedic, Habitat for Humanity Windsor-Essex, Independent First Nations Alliance, St. John Ambulance, Ontario Federation of Indigenous Friendship Centres, Kenora Chiefs Advisory – Ogimaawabiitong, Ontario Search and Rescue Volunteer Association (OSARVA), Ontario 211, Radio Amateurs of Canada, The Salvation Army and Team Rubicon Canada.

Ontario Corps brings a province-wide network of skilled professionals and highly trained volunteers that can be mobilized quickly to help communities hit hard by emergencies. Items partners have already used grants to purchase include

emergency food kits, GPS devices, satellite phones, canteen trucks, portable shelters, training volunteers for drone piloting and more.

During the ice storm that left thousands of Ontarians in the dark and cold earlier this year, [Ontario Corps partners were deployed](#), volunteering over 6,000 hours, providing tree-clearing services and supporting evacuation reception centres, providing over 3,700 meals and food hampers, and conducting over 4,100 wellness checks.

- Premier Ford announced the [launch of Ontario Corps](#) on December 13, 2024.
 - Ontario Corps resources are coordinated and deployed by the Provincial Emergency Operations Centre (PEOC) at the request of a municipality or First Nations community.
 - Through Ontario Corps, the government can deploy specialized equipment and personnel anywhere across Ontario within 24 to 72 hours to help support community response efforts.
 - In May 2025, the government re-introduced the [Emergency Management Modernization Act \(EMMA\)](#) to enhance public safety and disaster response measures, including by making Ontario Corps a key function of emergency responses in the province.

Ontario Signs New Free Trade Agreements with British Columbia and Canada's Three Territories

Memorandums of understanding now in place with 10 provinces and territories to grow Ontario's economy by removing internal trade barriers

HUNTSVILLE — Today, Ontario Premier Doug Ford was joined by British Columbia Premier David Eby, Yukon Premier Mike Pemberton, Northwest Territories Premier R.J. Simpson and Nunavut Premier P.J. Akeeagok to sign two new Memorandums of Understanding (MOUs) to boost internal trade, improve labour mobility and tear down long-standing barriers to doing business between provinces and territories. This included an [Ontario-British Columbia MOU](#) and an [MOU between Ontario and the three territories](#).

"With President Trump's ongoing threats to our economy, there's never been a more important time to boost internal trade to build a more competitive, resilient and self-reliant economy," said Premier Ford. "By signing these MOUs and working together, we're helping Canada unlock up to \$200 billion in economic potential and standing shoulder to shoulder to protect Canadian workers across the country."

Through these agreements, premiers are working together to eliminate red tape, cut costs for businesses and open new pathways for skilled workers to move more freely across the country. With the MOUs signed today, Ontario has now secured agreements with 10 provinces and territories, making Ontario the national leader in strengthening interprovincial trade and cooperation.

To support this work, the Ontario government recently passed the [Protect Ontario Through Free Trade Within Canada Act](#), which strengthens Ontario's ability to pursue cross-Canada commerce, withstand U.S. tariffs and tackle future economic challenges head-on. Ontario also remains the only province or territory to eliminate all party-specific exceptions under the [Canadian Free Trade Agreement](#).

“When Ontario and BC team up to knock down trade barriers, it’s good for workers, it’s good for businesses and it’s good for the people of both provinces,” said Premier David Eby, British Columbia. “Between our provinces, we have more than half of the population of the country. This agreement is key to unlocking one Canadian economy.”

“This agreement between Ontario and the territories is about making it easier for people, goods and ideas to move across the country,” said Premier Mike Pemberton, Yukon. “It’s an important step in reducing barriers and expanding opportunities for workers, businesses and communities in the North — building on progress we’ve already made. By working together, we’re helping ensure that the territories, including the Yukon, can fully participate in and contribute to Canada’s economy.”

“For the North to reach its full economic potential, we need to reduce the barriers that make it harder for our people and businesses to connect with the rest of the country — and for them to connect with us,” said Premier R.J. Simpson, Northwest Territories. “This agreement is a step toward that: supporting labour mobility, streamlining certification and opening up new opportunities for Northerners. It reflects a shared commitment to building a more open, connected and resilient Canadian economy.”

“This MOU is a strategic opportunity for Nunavut to enhance labour mobility, reduce trade barriers and strengthen our economic ties with other jurisdictions,” said Premier P.J. Akeeagok, Nunavut. “It positions Nunavut to be a more connected and competitive player in Canada’s economy.”

Premier Doug Ford will host Canada’s Premiers and their delegations for the [Council of the Federation’s 2025 Summer Meeting](#) from July 21–23.

- Thirty-five per cent of Canada's overall trade takes place within its own borders.

Ontario Investing \$45 Million to Support Community Non-Profit Organizations

Funding will protect Ontario by expanding critical programs and services that build stronger communities

TORONTO – The Ontario government is investing more than \$45 million through the Ontario Trillium Foundation (OTF) to support 140 non-profit organizations, Indigenous communities and small municipalities across the province in expanding and improving their programs and services. OTF grants support programs that promote active lifestyles, build engaged communities, enrich lives through arts, culture and heritage and support the development of children and youth.

“Whether it’s helping seniors stay physically active and learn new skills or connecting young people to their communities through the arts, non-profit organizations across Ontario deliver programs and services that make a real difference in people’s lives,” said Stan Cho, Minister of Tourism, Culture and Gaming. “Now more than ever, it’s vital that we help ensure local non-profit groups can build on their successes in ways that protect and build Ontario and benefit communities across the province.”

The OTF’s [Grow](#) stream grants provide support to non-profit organizations, helping them increase the impact of their community projects. Applicants can apply for grants of \$100,000 to \$600,000 over two to three years to expand, improve or adapt an existing program or service.

This year’s recipients include:

- Huron Women's Shelter Second Stage Housing and Counselling Services, which is receiving a \$599,700 Grow grant over three years to introduce an innovative housing model that provides relationship-centred approaches to support women and children impacted by gender-based violence.
- Durham Youth Housing and Support Services, which is receiving a \$429,800 Grow grant over three years to provide housing support to 190 youth, combining in-school and on-call supports.

- Food for Life, which is receiving a \$345,600 Grow grant over two years to improve food equity access programs by increasing cultural engagement, volunteerism, and food procurement and distribution to reflect diverse community needs in Halton Region.
- YMCA of Three Rivers, which is receiving a \$288,200 Grow grant over three years to expand day camp spaces and programming at Camp Belwood, increasing summer learning opportunities for youth aged 4-15.

“Grow grants provide essential funding that helps to strengthen Ontario's nonprofit sector,” said Katharine Bambrick, CEO of the Ontario Trillium Foundation. “By supporting the expansion of programs and services that matter, these grants help organizations deepen their impact and build more connected, resilient communities.”

Through OTF, Ontario has invested more than \$792 million in over 7,300 projects since 2018. These investments have created more than 9,490 full-time jobs and generated over \$1.1 billion in economic benefits for communities across the province.

- This is the first round of Grow grants since 2019. During the pandemic, Grow grants were paused, and funding was diverted to the temporary Resilient Communities Fund to help non-profits manage pandemic-related challenges. In 2024-25, OTF has returned to offering its Community Investment Grant programs, through the [Capital](#), [Seed](#) and Grow grant streams.

Ontario Investing \$260 Million to Protect and Train Workers

Latest round of funding is part of the province's \$2.5 billion investment in the Skills Development Fund

TORONTO — The Ontario government is continuing to deliver on its plan to protect workers by launching the sixth round of the [Skills Development Fund](#) (SDF) Training Stream. This round will provide \$260 million for innovative projects that support the hiring, training and upskilling of workers in manufacturing, health care, construction, automotive and other skilled trades. This investment is part of the government's \$2.5 billion investment through SDF to protect Ontario workers by giving them the tools they need to land rewarding, good-paying jobs, while keeping Ontario competitive in the face of U.S. tariffs and global economic uncertainty.

"Our government is protecting Ontario by training the workers we need to keep building, no matter what global challenges come our way," said David Piccini, Minister of Labour, Immigration, Training and Skills Development. "Through this \$260 million investment in the Skills Development Fund, we're funding results-driven training to build the strong workforce we need to support workers and their families and keep building Ontario's economy."

After five successful rounds of the SDF training stream, starting today, a wide range of organizations can now apply for project funding. Employers, employment service and training providers, labour unions, business and industry organizations, hospitals, Indigenous Band offices, Indigenous skills and employment training agreement holders, service system managers and other community organizations eligible for funding can submit their proposals through [Transfer Payment Ontario](#). Applications will close on October 1, 2025.

The announcement was made today in Toronto, where Minister Piccini also announced an investment of over \$20 million through the fifth round of SDF to train 4,825 workers and jobseekers for careers in the skilled trades, hospitality and Artificial Intelligence (AI) in health care. These projects include:

- **Support Ontario Youth:** \$3,750,000 to support 1,325 jobseekers, high school graduates and apprentices across 15 skilled trades through tailored education, hands on training, mentorship and employer matching. People interested in participating can visit <https://toolsinthetrades.ca/>.
- **Canadian Manufacturers & Exporters:** \$1,434,786 to train and upskill 500 individuals, including women, youth and newcomers for careers in manufacturing. People interested in participating can apply through <https://cme-mec.ca/cme-ontario-skills-development-program/>
- **Unite Here Local 75:** \$5,500,000 to train and upskill 1,440 jobseekers and hospitality workers for roles in Ontario's hospitality sector by offering foundational skills, hands-on training and certifications.
- **Finishing Trades Institute of Ontario:** \$3,776,668 to train 120 participants for painting and glazing trades across Toronto, Ottawa and Ancaster through job readiness training and 12-week placements. - **Ontario Electrical League:** \$2,995,000 to help 500 journeypersons, registered apprentices, people residing in remote/rural communities with financial aid, training and outreach to address labour shortages in the electrical sector. - **Workers First Technologies:** \$2,013,500 to create digital cross training for Personal Support Workers, Registered Practical Nurses, and Registered Nurses in hospitals and long-term care centres to improve patient care. Learn more at www.workersfirst.io.
- **Youth Employment Services (YES):** \$1,105,125 to provide 140 unemployed youth and other underrepresented groups such as women and people with disabilities with opportunities to learn in-demand skills in Cyber and artificial intelligence (AI). Since its launch in 2021, Ontario's SDF has supported over 1,000 training projects across the province that aims to connect over 700,000 people with training for better jobs with bigger paycheques. As announced in the [2025 Budget: A Plan to Protect Ontario](#), this next round of funding for the SDF Training Stream is part of the government's nearly \$1 billion expansion of the SDF over the next three years, for a total of \$2.5 billion, to support major industries and sectors while training the workers needed to build and strengthen Ontario's economy to withstand whatever comes our way.

- The SDF has two streams: the [Training Stream](#) supports hiring, training, and upskilling programs for jobseekers, apprentices, and workers; and the [Capital Stream](#) supports upgrades or construction of training centres to train people for emerging and in-demand jobs in critical sectors of Ontario's economy.
- Since its launch in 2021, Ontario's [SDF Training Stream](#) has aimed to help over 700,000 workers train for in-demand sectors, including over 154,000 construction workers, over 124,000 manufacturing workers and over 52,000 personal support workers and health care workers.
- Today's announcement of Toronto-based funding will deliver necessary training in Ontario's economic hub. In the first quarter of 2025, there were 87,955 (47 per cent) jobs going unfilled in Toronto.
- In Round 5, a total of 816 applications were received. Of these, 246 projects were selected, representing a total investment of \$345 million to support the training of over 121,700 individuals. The projects selected include 105 (43 per cent) that will support the construction of buildings, 63 (26 per cent) that will support specialty trade contractors, and 35 (14 per cent) that will support heavy and civil engineering construction.
- The SDF Training Stream Rounds 1-5 are supported through labour market transfer agreements between the Government of Canada and the Government of Ontario. SDF Training Round 6 is supported exclusively by the Government of Ontario.

Province Investing \$345 Million to Protect Ontario from Human Trafficking

Government's Anti-Human Trafficking Strategy has supported tens of thousands of survivors as province expands specialized intervention teams to Kenora

KENORA — The Ontario government is protecting young people and vulnerable communities by investing \$345 million to renew its [Anti-Human Trafficking Strategy](#) (AHTS) – the largest investment of its kind in the country. Since its launch in 2020, the strategy has trained more than 1,000 front-line workers and helped tens of thousands of survivors, as well as children who were being or at risk of being trafficked, leading to hundreds of charges and arrests. As part of the strategy, the province is also officially launching a new Children at Risk of Exploitation (CARE) Unit in Kenora to help protect children and youth in the region from sex trafficking and support survivors.

“As we mark World Day Against Trafficking in Persons, it is more important than ever to expand our work with community partners to protect children and youth, support survivors and hold offenders accountable,” said Michael Parsa, Minister of Children, Community and Social Services. “Under the leadership of Premier Ford, our government is proud to renew Ontario’s Historic Anti-Human Trafficking Strategy. The launch of the Kenora [CARE \(Children at Risk of Exploitation\)](#) Unit is part of our plan to ensure vulnerable people can get support in every corner of our province.”

Ontario’s [AHTS \(Anti-Human Trafficking Strategy\)](#) – [renewed in the Spring 2025](#) – is centred on four pillars: awareness and prevention, protecting victims, supporting survivors and holding offenders accountable. As part of the [AHTS \(Anti-Human Trafficking Strategy\)](#), Ontario established its first two [CARE \(Children at Risk of Exploitation\)](#) Units in Toronto and Durham Region. These specialized intervention teams of child protection workers, police officers and Indigenous liaisons work collaboratively to identify and locate children and youth who are being sex

trafficked or are at risk, connect them to services, and support investigations to hold offenders accountable, serving more than 200 children ages 12 to 17 every year.

“Today’s launch of the new Kenora CARE (Children at Risk of Exploitation) Unit is a direct response to what communities across Northwestern Ontario have been calling for: targeted, trauma-informed services for youth when and where they need them,” said Greg Rickford, MPP (Member of provincial Parliament) for Kenora—Rainy River and Minister of Indigenous Affairs and First Nations Economic Reconciliation. “Our government’s additional \$6 million investment will strengthen the front-line services that are already making a difference and ensure young people at risk of exploitation have access to the safe spaces and stability they deserve.”

To support the Kenora CARE (Children at Risk of Exploitation) Unit, the Ontario government is providing \$6 million over three years to increase trauma-informed and specialized supports in the region for children and youth who have been sex trafficked. As part of this investment, there will be a new licensed out-of-home care residence for survivors and a new Youth-In-Transition Worker in the region, specialized in anti-human trafficking.

“The Kenora CARE (Children at Risk of Exploitation) Unit will help ensure that those tasked with protecting children and youth have the tools needed to act swiftly to prevent sex trafficking and connect survivors to the supports they deserve,” said Solicitor General Michael Kerzner. “This new unit, together with the renewal of the Anti-Human Trafficking Strategy, demonstrates our government’s ongoing work, empowering law enforcement to combat human trafficking in this province.”

Building on the success of the first two units, the Kenora CARE (Children at Risk of Exploitation) Unit will be led by Anishinaabe Abinoojii Family Services and Kenora-Rainy River Districts Child & Family Services, who will work with the Kenora Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) and the OPP (Ontario Provincial Police)’s Anti-Human Trafficking team assigned to the area. Ontario’s renewed Anti-Human Trafficking Strategy will continue to invest in actions across government to combat human trafficking and child exploitation and protect the province’s most vulnerable people.

Quick Facts

- In Ontario, the most common form of human trafficking is sex trafficking. The average age of recruitment into sex trafficking in Canada is 13 years old.

- In the first four years of Ontario's Anti-Human Trafficking Strategy, service providers helped more than 29,000 people affected by human trafficking.
- Kenora was selected as the next CARE (Children at Risk of Exploitation) unit location due to its airport, highways, proximity to the provincial border and popularity as a summer vacation destination, which create increased risk of sex trafficking for children and youth living within and around Kenora, as well as those traveling through the area.
- The Kenora CARE (Children at Risk of Exploitation) unit will also receive support from Tikinagan Child and Family Services and Weechi-it-te-win Family Services.

Ontario Investing \$3 Million to Support Cleaner and Healthier Communities

Applications now open for community projects that protect and restore local natural habitats and greenspaces

TORONTO — The Ontario government is making almost \$3 million available to community groups and other non-profit organizations for innovative projects to build cleaner, healthier communities such as shoreline cleanups, habitat restoration and tree planting. As part of the government's plan to protect Ontario, the [Ontario Community Environment Fund](#) (OCEF) uses penalties paid by polluters to fund projects that protect Ontario's land, air, and water – supporting healthy communities and strong local economies.

"We are giving local groups the resources they need to make their communities cleaner and safer places to live, work and raise their families by restoring the natural beauty of these regions for everyone to enjoy," said Todd McCarthy, Minister of the Environment, Conservation and Parks. "The OCEF program is just one of the ways our government is empowering communities to protect and restore our natural heritage for generations to come."

Applications are now open and must be [submitted online](#) by 5 p.m. (EDT) on September 24, 2025. Since 2010, the Ontario Community Environment Fund has invested more than \$3.8 million from environmental penalties into 108 projects that have led to planting over 450,000 trees, shrubs and plants, restoring 52 km of shoreline and collecting 1,350 bags of litter.

Recent projects include:

- **Brant County – Parks Enhancement (Paris):** Brant County is planting 5,000 native trees and shrubs, protecting unique Carolinian forest ecosystems by removing invasive species, and enhancing eight kilometres of park trails near historic downtown Paris.

- **Manitoulin Streams – Creek Restoration and Garbage Cleanup (Manitoulin Island):** The Manitoulin Streams Improvement Association led an island-wide garbage cleanup to reduce plastic waste in local watersheds, planted 700 native trees and shrubs to restore riparian zones, enhanced a cold-water stream habitat, and installed 445 metres of fencing to keep livestock out of Grimesthorpe Creek.
 - **Scouts Canada – Oak Savanna Restoration (Lambton Shores):** Scouts Canada removed invasive pine trees and planted native trees to protect a globally rare and environmentally significant Oak Savanna ecosystem, of which only 3 per cent remains in Ontario.

- Eligible projects must demonstrate a direct environmental benefit and be located in a region where funding is available. Indigenous communities and organizations, not-for-profits, academic institutions, and municipalities are encouraged to apply.
 - Applications will be evaluated through a competitive process. Successful applicants will be notified directly in early 2026.
 - In 2025, over \$1,602,000 of funding is available in Southwestern Ontario, over \$721,000 in West Central Ontario, and over \$585,000 in Northern Ontario.
 - Under the Environmental Protection Act, the person or company who spills a pollutant into the environment, is legally responsible for the [cleanup of the spill](#).

Ontario Investing \$7.7 Million to Support Indian Residential School Survivors

Applications now open for communities and organizations that provide supports to survivors and their families impacted by burial investigations

TORONTO – The Ontario government is investing \$7.7 million to launch the Indian Residential School Community Engagement Fund (IRSCEF). This funding is available to communities and organizations to provide culturally appropriate mental health and wellness supports to survivors and their families impacted by ongoing burial investigations at former Residential Schools.

“Ontario is continuing its steadfast support for Indigenous communities and organizations to deliver programs that support the healing of Residential School Survivors and their families,” said Greg Rickford, Minister of Indigenous Affairs and First Nations Economic Reconciliation. “This investment is in direct response to what communities have told us they need – flexible, community-driven resources that address the impacts of this difficult work. We are committed to walking this path with Indigenous partners by supporting healing, truth-telling and education in a way that reflects their priorities and leadership.”

Eligible communities and organizations can receive up to \$250,000 for initiatives such as public education and awareness, survivor engagement, gatherings, commemoration initiatives and research activities that connect community members to ongoing investigations. Applications for funding are open through the Ontario government’s [Transfer Payment Ontario website](#) until September 8, 2025.

The IRSCEF is part of the \$32.1 million included in the [2025 Budget: A Plan to Protect Ontario](#) to support burial investigations at former Indian Residential Schools. This includes \$17.1 million for planned and ongoing burial investigations and up to \$15 million in mental health, addictions and trauma supports.

Ontario continues to advance meaningful reconciliation by working with Indigenous partners to explore opportunities that strengthen the collective awareness and understanding of the painful legacy of these institutions. To date,

Ontario has invested \$124.5 million to support the identification, investigation, protection and commemoration of burials at former Residential Schools across the province.

Ontario Releases 2025–26 First Quarter Finances

Government remains focused on protecting Ontario and making the province the most competitive economy in the G7

TORONTO — Today, the Ontario government released the [2025–26 First Quarter Finances](#), the first update on the province's economic and fiscal outlook since the release of the [2025 Ontario Budget: A Plan to Protect Ontario](#).

The report provides updated information about Ontario's finances, reflecting the government's responsible approach to public finances while protecting the economy and keeping costs down for families.

"The government's commitment to fiscal prudence has put Ontario's finances in the strongest position they have been for over a decade," said Peter Bethlenfalvy, Minister of Finance. "In the face of economic uncertainty, our plan will continue to protect Ontario's workers, businesses, and jobs from the impacts of U.S. tariffs while building a more resilient and self-reliant economy to secure long-term prosperity."

In the first calendar quarter of 2025, Ontario's real gross domestic product (GDP) increased by 0.6 per cent, matching growth in the fourth quarter of 2024, supported by higher exports and household spending.

Other key indicators in the report remain unchanged from the projections in the *2025 Ontario Budget*. As of the *2025–26 First Quarter Finances*, the province's 2025–26 deficit is projected to be \$14.6 billion, and projections for government revenues are \$219.9 billion – both in line with the *2025 Ontario Budget* forecast.

The province will retain a path to a balanced budget by 2027-28, and the government will provide a comprehensive multi-year fiscal outlook as part of the *2025 Ontario Economic Outlook and Fiscal Review* later this year.

Quick Facts

- Key measures of government financial health remain some of the strongest seen in over a decade. Ontario's net debt-to-GDP ratio of 37.9 per cent remains close to the lowest level achieved since 2013–14, while net interest costs as a share of revenue are still near the lowest levels since the 1980s.
- Program expense in 2025–26 is projected to be \$216.3 billion, also unchanged from the *2025 Ontario Budget* forecast, as well as the Interest and Other Debt Servicing Charges and the cost of borrowing in 2025–26.
- Interest and Other Debt Servicing Charges is projected to be \$16.2 billion, unchanged from the forecast in the *2025 Ontario Budget*. Ontario's forecasted cost of borrowing remains at 4.0 per cent.
- The *2025 Ontario Budget* included a \$2.0 billion reserve in 2025–26 to protect the fiscal outlook against any unforeseen changes in the province's revenue and expense forecasts, which has been maintained as part of the current fiscal outlook.
- All four major credit rating agencies have affirmed Ontario's double-A credit rating, reflecting Ontario's commitment to maintaining its targets for debt sustainability measures despite the economic and geopolitical uncertainties the province is currently facing.
- Green Bonds remain a core component of Ontario's borrowing program, and the province remains the largest issuer of Canadian dollar Green Bonds totalling \$21.5 billion since 2014–15, with \$16.8 billion outstanding.
- Ontario's borrowing program is well ahead of schedule, as the province has already completed nearly half of the borrowing requirements projected for 2025–26. This helps manage risks related to the uncertain economic and financial market backdrop.
- The government will provide its next financial update as part of the *2025 Ontario Economic Outlook and Fiscal Review*, also referred to as the Fall Economic Statement, on or before November 15, 2025.

Ontario Investing \$1.6 Billion in Municipal Housing Infrastructure Program

Latest investment increases fund to \$4 billion, supporting hundreds of thousands of new homes and keeping workers on the job in the face of tariffs

OTTAWA — Today, Premier Doug Ford announced at the annual Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) conference that the Ontario government is protecting communities, lowering costs and strengthening Ontario's economy by investing an additional \$1.6 billion to speed up construction on homes and critical infrastructure. This investment [nearly doubles the Municipal Housing Infrastructure Program \(MHIP\) to \\$4 billion](#), building on the province's most recent \$400 million increase in the 2025 provincial budget and giving municipalities and Indigenous communities the resources to build roads, bridges and water systems that make new housing possible.

"We're making record investments in housing and infrastructure so we can keep workers on the job and help families across the province find a home that meets their needs and their budgets," said Premier Doug Ford. "Working with our municipal partners, we're going to keep lowering costs, investing in infrastructure and cutting red tape so we can keep the dream of homeownership alive in Ontario."

Since its launch in 2024, the MHIP has enabled the construction of 800,000 homes across the province. In conjunction with the province's \$1.2 billion Building Faster Fund, which rewards municipalities that meet and exceed their housing targets, these investments give communities the resources they need to keep delivering results.

"This additional \$1.6 billion investment in the Municipal Housing Infrastructure Program will help communities across Ontario build the infrastructure they need to unlock more housing and support economic growth," said Kinga Surma, Minister of Infrastructure. "In the face of unwarranted U.S. tariffs, our government is doubling

down on our plan to build and investing more than \$200 billion through our capital plan to protect Ontario by getting shovels in the ground faster on the projects that matter most.”

Investing in local infrastructure is part of the government’s more than \$200 billion plan to protect Ontario families by building more transit, highways, hospitals, schools and housing-enabling infrastructure, including over \$33 billion this year alone. This is the most ambitious capital plan in the province’s history.

“For far too long, too many families, first-time home buyers, and seniors have been priced out of the market,” said Rob Flack, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing. “Our government recognizes that this must change. Today’s investment is part of our plan to use every tool in our toolbox to bring costs down and builds upon recent initiatives such as the *Protect Ontario by Building Faster and Smarter Act*.”

“Investments in municipal infrastructure have consistently proven to be the best way to protect local, provincial and national economies,” said Robin Jones, AMO President and Mayor of Westport. “These investments will not just help to build homes, they will provide thousands of jobs in communities across the province and lay the foundation for long-term productivity. We commend Premier Ford for these important investments.”

- The government’s investment follows \$82 million in recent funding announced for agricultural infrastructure projects in Niagara Region and the Municipality of Leamington that will protect Ontario’s agri-food sector, as well as \$400 million to support 50 new water infrastructure projects that will support 86,000 new homes in the region.

County of Renfrew Launches Regional Incentive Program - HYPE

The County of Renfrew is now accepting applications from local municipalities for its regional incentive program – **HYPE (Helping Your Place Excel)** – which provides matching grant funding – up to 50% – to stimulate private sector investment, attract and retain businesses, and improve business and community appeal.

Aligned with the County's strategic priorities, the HYPE Program drives economic development by offering financial incentives that support local municipal Community Improvement Plans (CIPs). The HYPE Program promotes and supports a wide range of economic goals, including affordable housing, tourism, business retention and expansion, and investment readiness. Eligible projects may include, but are not limited to, private sector investment, enhancing tourist accommodations, growing attainable and affordable housing, fostering agriculture development, revitalizing downtowns, expanding trail networks, improving accessibility and energy efficiency, and advancing projects with positive environmental impacts.

As recently amended in the County of Renfrew's Official Plan, this regional incentive program is an enabling policy that grants the County the ability to offer financial support to local municipalities to implement their Community Improvement Plans. Currently, that includes the Towns of Arnprior, Deep River, Petawawa and Renfrew and the Townships of Admaston/Bromley, Bonnechere Valley, Horton, Laurentian Valley and Whitewater Region.

Community Improvement Plans (CIPs) are a municipal financial tool used to stimulate development and revitalization to enhance the overall quality of life in a community. Through financial incentives like grants or loans, property and business owners can improve buildings and lands within a defined project area. The HYPE Program, in conjunction with local CIPs, can provide up to \$30,000 depending on the project.

“The HYPE program is a valuable initiative that enables the County to support economic development efforts of local municipalities while aligning with regional strategic goals,” says David Wybou, Business Development Officer with the County of Renfrew and HYPE Program Administrator.

Interested applicants are encouraged to explore the local Community Improvement Plan within their municipalities to learn more about how to access financial support, including the HYPE Program.

The County began accepting applications from municipalities for HYPE funding on July 28, 2025 for a two-week intake period. Following notification to municipalities of the approval status, applications will continue to be received and evaluated on a first-come, first-serve basis if funds remain.

County Road 20 (Castleford Road) – Township of Horton

Helping People Stay Safe: Local Drug Strategy Making Progress - A Harm Reduction Pillar Update

The Renfrew County & District Drug Strategy (RCDDS) is reporting early progress in helping people stay safe and healthy when it comes to substance use. Since over 30 local drug strategy partners began meeting in early 2024, and launching the strategy's report earlier this year, the RCDDS has focused on practical ways to reduce harm and save lives.

Early indicators show cause for cautious optimism that our collective efforts are making a difference. From July 1st, 2024 to June 30th, 2025 Renfrew County and District saw a 39% reduction in suspect drug-toxicity deaths and a 51% reduction in opioid-overdose visits to local emergency departments, compared to the previous 12 month period. While smaller declines are also being observed across Ontario, and year-to-year numbers can fluctuate significantly, these results suggest we are moving in the right direction.

The *Harm Reduction Pillar* is one of the key parts of this plan. It's all about meeting people where they are, offering support without judgment, and helping reduce the risks that come with drug use.

To date in 2025, the following progress has been made:

Increased Access and Awareness of Remote Spotting Services

People using drugs alone can get help through a free, 24/7 phone line called the National Overdose Response Service (NORS). It connects them with someone who can call for help if needed. This service was promoted through six social media campaigns, reaching over 45,000 people. To access NORS call 1-888-688-6677.

Community Outreach

Drug Strategy partners are meeting and serving people in their community. The health unit public health nurse outreach team provides harm reduction and other public health services to people in high need. So far in 2025, they have had over 1,300 interactions through outreach, handed out nearly 700 naloxone kits, and trained over 200 people on

how to properly administer naloxone. Additionally, the [Mesa Team](#) has assisted 160 people through over 3,300 interactions.

Life-Saving Naloxone in Your Community

Naloxone is a medication that can reverse an opioid overdose. In 2024, the number of local organizations able to provide naloxone as part of the *Ontario Naloxone Program* doubled to 14, and over 4,400 doses were distributed - a 59% increase from the year before. **If you, a family member, or friend are at risk of an opioid overdose you can obtain a naloxone kit at local pharmacies or the Renfrew County and District Health Unit.** Sixteen community partners are currently distributing the life-saving naloxone kits.

"People's lives and well-being depend on getting this right," said Dr. Jason Morgenstern, Co-Chair of the RCDDS Steering Committee. "We work side-by-side with frontline teams and people with lived experience to make sure services are welcoming, evidence-based, and delivered with compassion and respect."

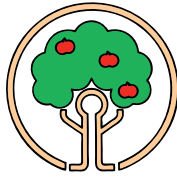
Co-Chair Jama Watt added, "This work is about meeting people where they are and equipping our communities with the tools and information they need to stay safe. By working together, we can reduce preventable deaths and better support those affected by substance use."

Bat in Renfrew County and District Tests Positive for Rabies

Renfrew County and District Health Unit (RCDHU) has received confirmation that a bat collected in the City of Pembroke has tested positive for the rabies virus. The bat was submitted as part of an investigation into a potential human exposure and RCDHU has followed up with those involved to prevent rabies infection.

Local human-bat exposures have been increasing in recent weeks and RCDHU is advising Renfrew County and District residents to remain vigilant about the risk of rabies. This animal rabies case is the first in Renfrew County and District this year. From 2021-2025, 33 bats have been submitted for rabies testing. Of these 33, four (12%) tested positive for rabies.

Rabies is a viral infection that causes inflammation of the brain and spinal cord, which is almost always fatal. Rabies is transmitted to humans through direct contact with saliva from an infected animal, usually through a bite, but saliva contamination of cuts, scratches, or mucous membrane is also possible. The animals that most commonly have rabies in Ontario are bats, skunks, and raccoons. Human rabies cases in Canada are very rare.

RCDHU advises residents to do the following to protect against rabies:

- Vaccinate your pets against rabies; it is the law in Ontario that all cats, dogs, and ferrets over 3 months of age are vaccinated against rabies.
- Stay away from wild animals and always refrain from feeding, touching, or handling wildlife.
- Do not trap and transport wild animals to a new location.
- Warn children to stay away from wild or stray animals.
- Keep pets away from wild animals and do not let pets roam unsupervised.
- Bat-proof your home or cottage by:
 - Caulking holes in the exterior, even those as small as one-quarter to one-half inch in diameter.

- Tightening screens, capping your chimney, placing draft guards under doors leading to the attic and outside, and filling plumbing fixture holes with steel wool or caulk.
- Keeping doors tightly closed when going outside and coming back indoors.

If you have been bitten or scratched by an animal:

- Collect the contact information of the animal's owner/custodian where applicable (their name, address and phone number).
- Immediately thoroughly wash all bite or scratch wounds with soap and water.
- Seek immediate medical attention to assess the need for post exposure treatment. Rabies vaccines are highly effective at preventing the disease if administered soon after an exposure.
- Report the incident to RCDHU at 613-732-3629 ext 505.

If you find a bat in your home:

- Confine the bat to one room, turn off the light and open a window so that it can fly out on its own.
- If the bat does not leave on its own, contact pest control experts who can humanely capture and release the bat.
- If the bat is found in a bedroom, there has been any direct contact with a child, or you cannot rule out exposure to the bat's saliva, call a healthcare provider or RCDHU at 613-732-3629 ext 505 for advice immediately.
- Bats have tiny teeth and a bite mark from a bat can be difficult to find.

Policy Update - Comments on Bill 9, OPP Billing Review, Waste Management and OMA Consultations at the AMO Conference

AMO Comments on Bill 9, *Municipal Accountability Act, 2025*

The *Municipal Accountability Act, 2025* is a necessary step forward in supporting safe and respectful working environments for members of council and municipal staff. The municipal sector has long advocated for provincial code of conduct legislation and AMO commends Minister Flack for reintroducing this important bill.

Yesterday, AMO President Robin Jones presented to the Standing Committee on Heritage, Infrastructure, and Cultural Policy. She expressed broad support for many aspects of the legislation, including the enabling of the standardization of municipal codes of conduct and integrity commissioner investigation processes.

In her remarks and [our written submission](#), AMO has advocated for two amendments to the legislation:

- **AMO recommends that the removal from office vote be adjusted from unanimous to a supermajority (a vote by at least 2/3 of Council).** We recognize that a vote to remove an elected municipal official from office is fundamentally different than a regular council vote, but the current proposal sets too high of a threshold. Previously,

AMO had advocated for the removal from office procedure to be in the hands of the judiciary. However, in recognizing that the government is interested in leaving this decision to elected municipal officials, we believe that a council supermajority vote is more appropriate.

- **AMO recommends that the legislation includes a progressive range of discipline options for integrity commissioners, aligned with what was established under the *Education Act* in 2023.** This would provide a standard list of penalties that could be applied apart from removal from office, including censure of a member, barring attendance at meetings, barring a member from sitting on committees, and barring a member from being chair or vice chair of committees.

AMO Input on the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) Billing Model Review

Earlier this summer, the Ministry of the Solicitor General wrote to all impacted Mayors and CAOs announcing the launch of a review of the OPP billing model. The Ministry has been consulting widely with municipalities over the past month.

On July 11th, AMO [wrote to the Solicitor General](#) to provide input on behalf of the entire municipal sector. AMO appreciates the province's willingness to consider changes to the current OPP billing model. However, increasing police costs are impacting all Ontario municipalities and are only one element of a broader discussion that is needed on reforming the provincial-municipal fiscal relationship.

To that end, AMO made comments on:

- Improving transparency and bill timing
- Addressing municipal police spending on areas of provincial responsibility
- Provincial funding to offset costs associated with police away from work on WSIB approved leaves of absences
- Removing a 2008 cap on provincial funding for uploaded prisoner transport and court security costs
- Addressing the inequitable cost burden faced by service hub municipalities

AMO looks forward to continuing to work with the government to ensure both community safety and fiscal sustainability for our members.

AMO Advocacy on Waste Management

AMO has sent two letters to the Minister of the Environment, Conservation and Parks regarding waste management practices in Ontario. AMO continues to support exploring new approaches to supporting priority projects and meeting the waste management needs of Ontario's growing communities.

AMO [wrote to the Minister on July 7](#) expressing concerns about proposed amendments to the Blue Box Regulation that would delay recovery targets, reverse producer responsibility for away-from-home public space blue bin collection, and remove the planned expansion of blue box services for multi-residential buildings, schools, long-term care, and retirement homes. These changes would likely reduce waste diversion rates, increase municipal waste management costs, and leave residents without blue box service.

On July 15, [AMO wrote to the Minister](#) about the use of Bill 5 to remove environmental assessment (EA) requirements for the Dresden Waste Disposal Site (a landfill). While we recognize that the EA process can be onerous and create delays in advancing landfills, this decision sets a precedent that could see any of the over 600 active and inactive landfills across Ontario expanded without reviewing impacts to the environment or nearby communities. AMO recommends the Province establish a modernized approval process for landfills, balancing the need to expedite waste management infrastructure with strong environmental and community protection.

OMA Healthcare Meetings with Municipalities at the AMO Conference

Across Ontario, communities continue to face serious challenges in our health-care system, including: long wait times for surgeries and specialist care, difficulty finding a family doctor and increasing demands for mental health services. These are not just medical issues; they are economic and community challenges that affect every resident and municipality.

Building on last year's successful collaboration with the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO), the Ontario Medical Association (OMA) will again host one-on-one meetings at the Fairmont Château Laurier, across the road from the Conference venue, on August 18 and 19. These 15-minute sessions are an opportunity to share your community's health-care concerns directly with our senior leadership and discuss how the OMA can partner more closely going forward.



CHIEF & COUNCIL UPDATE

August 8th, 2025



Construction on Pikwakanagan's new water treatment plant and the work to supply good water to all our houses continues, now going into our third year. This is a really big job and it seems like it is taking forever, but now the end of construction is in sight and we are asking the community to be patient for a little while longer.

We have been informed that the mechanical and electrical works in the plant will be completed by September 30 this year and security fencing around the plant will be completed by October 31. Outside the plant, the installation of all watermains are planned to be complete by the end of September this year and the waterlines to all houses and other buildings are planned to be completed by October 31, this year also.

Water service connections to our houses and buildings are planned to begin in the spring of 2026 and completed by the end of June 2026. There are 242 houses and buildings to be hooked up, and when the plant produces potable water, the water distribution system can be brought online. After 38 years of trying, we will finally have good water to all of our houses and then, after all of that, repaving of our roads can occur.

"The construction of this water treatment plant is more than just infrastructure – it is a long-overdue promise to our people. This project reflects the strength of our Nation, the persistence of our leadership, and our unwavering commitment to future generations. COMMUNITY UPDATE

Ontario Bill 5 - Protect Ontario by Unleashing our Economy Act 2025 and Federal Bill C-5 - One Canadian Economy Legislation

Both legislations were developed without AOPFN's free, prior and informed consent (FPIC), which violates our rights under Section 35 of the Canadian Constitution and the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP).

BACKGROUND - Ontario Bill 5:

- April 27, 2025 - Bill 5 was **tabled** in the House of Commons
- June 4, 2025 – Bill 5 was **passed** by the Legislature
 - Bill 5 supports **faster development** by significantly accelerating provincial permitting and approvals, and would give the government the authority to designate special **economic zones**, where projects of provincial importance and security that are ready to advance and be led by trusted proponents, can benefit from streamlined requirements.
 - **Bill 5 changes impact the following Acts for all First Nations in Ontario:**
 - Endangered Species Conservation Act, Mining Act, Ontario Heritage Act, Special Economic Zones Act, and the Species Conservation Act.
- May 16, 2025 - AOPFN submitted our 'opposed response' online and by the deadline of May 17th.
- May 30, 2025 - AOPFN Community Update #1 was posted in the Newsletter & Facebook page
- June 2, 2025 - Chiefs of Ontario rallied at Queen's Park in TO, AOPFN unable to attend unfortunately
- June 6, 2025 - AOPFN Community Update #2 was posted in the Newsletter & Facebook page

BACKGROUND - Federal Bill C-5:

- May 26, 2025 - Bill C-5 was **tabled** in the House of Commons
- June 26, 2025 – Bill C-5 was **passed** by the Senate
 - Bill C-5 is an Act that enacts the Free Trade and Labor Mobility in Canada Act and the Building Canada Act, which allows the Canadian Government to **fast-track major projects** that are **deemed to be of national interest**.
 - Bill C-5 significantly weakens environmental protections and allows the Government to **bypass critical processes** that safeguard species at risk, cultural heritage, and treaty rights.
 - It concentrates decision-making power in the hands of Ministers and the Lieutenant Governor without mandating First Nation involvement, threatening sovereignty, and stewardship, and ongoing reconciliation efforts.
 - The speed of its formulation and implementation will make it impossible for the Government to uphold their commitments on the UNDRIP and Duty to Consult.
- June 17, 2025 - AOPFN Chief & Council sent our opposition letter to the Prime Minister of Canada.
- June 17, 2025 - the Chiefs of Ontario protested at Parliament Hill in Ottawa, in which AOPFN Chief & Council attended and Chief Sarazin spoke at.
- July 8, 2025 – AOPFN Chief & Council received an email reply on behalf of the Prime Minister of Canada, acknowledging receipt of AOPFN's opposition letter to Bill C-5 dated June 17, 2025.



KEY DATES & EVENTS:

- July 15, 2025 - AOPFN Consultation Department held a **Community Meeting** to provide updates on Bill 5 & Bill C-5 and to share AOPFN's initial comments. Roughly 15 members attended and had the following questions:

1. Based on Bill 5 changes, does that mean they won't consult with First Nations?

- It could, but we don't know yet.

2. When UNDRIP was created in Canada, AOPFN was one of the last ones to sign it. How or will that amend the Bill 5 legislation?

- We can share more, once when we have an opportunity to engage with the Government of Canada.

3. Who can attend the Bill C-5 Summit on July 16 & 17 in Gatineau?

- Only one leadership member from each First Nation was allowed to attend.
- AOPFN thought there was a Rally being organized but realized there wasn't

4. Members asked why AOPFN has been so reactive vs proactive?

- Both Legislations appeared and passed very quickly by Parliament, not giving AOPFN enough time to be proactive.
- AOPFN is working on being more prepared for all actions in relation to both Bills moving forward



5. What is the reason why we need to slow these [projects] down even more?

- AOPFN wants to make sure that proper consultation takes place on each project, which takes time.

6. How long do we think it will take to get proper resources?

- It can take a very long time, 6 months just for staffing and 6 months to a year for training. Look at a year and a half potentially

7. Are we creating a committee for this? It might be better than community meetings

- We will certainly take this suggestion into consideration.

8. Was Bill C-5 created as a streamline process to counter Trump's annexing Canada?

- The short answer is yes, but that's not the only reason.

9. Has any university or organization ever done a study on how effective Rallies are in creating change?

- a famous protest called the 'Oka crisis' in 1990. In that protest, the Government rolled out RCAP docs. Also mentioned was the 'Standing Rock' pipeline protest in the USA

- July 16 & 17, 2025 – a **Bill C-5 Summit** was held in Gatineau, QC by the Prime Minister of Canada with Ontario First Nation Leaders:

- As per the PM - today is about our economies and how we can build a new economy together, respecting rights is about our economies and how we can build a new economy together, respecting right is fundamental, and they will offer consultation process for feedback.
- **The One Economy Act can:** create careers, provide resources to health and social services, build Canadian's projects to build the nation's economy, and will build with First Nations and projects will be built with First Nations as partners.
- Projects will honour the rights, and new Indigenous Offices will have a council. This council will have a mix of Indigenous, Metis, and other groups.

- July 27, 2025 - **National Chief's Press Conference** held on by day two of the **Bill C-5 Summit**:

- A land recognition statement was made by the National Chief in regard to Algonquin Anishinabeg Territory.
- First Nations and Canada are at a critical point in nation-to-nation relationships.
- Historically, First Nations have stood up for Canada and are doing so again in Canada's stand against Trump's illegal tariffs.
- First Nations have always supported economic growth and prosperity, but not at the expense of our rights and the environment

- July 27, 2025 - **Chief Sarazin addresses on behalf of AOPFN**, on day two of the **Bill C-5 Summit**:

- In recent decades Indigenous Peoples and the Government of Canada have made incredible progress in building a vision of Canada that works for all of us.
- These Bills give Cabinet Ministers the ability to create Special Economic Zones (SEZ), something AOPFN is not overly familiar with. These SEZ can be anywhere in Ontario, and companies can get exemptions from Provincial and Federal laws within the SEZ.
- The only safety valve that appears to be build into Bill C-5, is that it will simply go away in five years. if it doesn't work out. My people believe that this is not enough, and we do not like any government directives where the backup plan involves sweeping it under the rug, and pretending it never happened.

Chief Sarazin's address con't:

- If the Canadian Government does not make this right, if it does not give all Indigenous Peoples the tools to participate in the One Canadian Economy legislation, this will be yet another occasion where it has robbed Indigenous people of their voices, and of their natural wealth and their sacred lands would otherwise provide
- The Algonquins of Pikwakanagan do not need to be taught how to protect our lands and waters we need the time to teach others how to protect our lands and waters – and if you insist that we only have half of that time, then it sounds like we need double the resources. We need capacity, we need tools, and we need the trust from governments, proponents, and partners that what our people want, need, and demand is what's best for all Canadians.
- We are demanding to keep comprehensive and effective consultations going. We are demanding our place as an integral part of if and when a proponent gains access to our unceded unsundered territory.
- Together we can prosper; and if we do it the right way, the way our ancestors have done since time immemorial, our descendants can do the same seven generations from now.

AOPFN NEXT STEPS:

- The Consultation Team will:
 - Continue to monitor all media coverage on both legislations and will provide on-going updates to Chief & Council as required.
 - Keep members informed of any potential Rallies held by any indigenous organizations.
 - Will prioritize and finalize existing Consultation Department Protocols and Policies
 - Will conduct an analysis of Bill 5 and Bill C-5 in regard to our existing FPIC approach, and where these laws have impact on AOPFN's FPIC approach.
- AOPFN will continue to stay in close contact with the Chief of Ontario, as AOPFN will need to have an action plan from the Chief when things potentially go wrong.
- AOPFN is currently waiting on funding, as PIK has already incurred costs in doing work on these Bills to date.
- **July 23, 2025 - Consultation Bill 5 was initiated with AOPFN**, from the Ministry of Economic Development, Job Creation & Trade, and the Office of the Deputy Minister. The title of the email was: **Proposed Regulation Criteria under Bill 5 Special Economic Zones Act, the Ontario Heritage Act, and Archaeology Exemptions**.
 - The Ontario ministries are seeking input from all First Nations, as they work to develop regulations under each Act above, and the Assistant Deputy Ministers and Directors have invited AOPFN to participate in upcoming Consultation Session(s), to discuss the proposals and provide an opportunity for Ontario to hear from AOPFN about any question/or concerns AOPFN may have about the potential impacts to our Aboriginal or treaty rights.
- July 24, 2025-AOPFN requested a one-on-one consultation **Meeting** with the Province too.
- July 30, 2025-AOPFN will attend a virtual Consultation **Session** in August, hosted by the Ministry of Economic Development, Job Creation & Trade and the Office of the Deputy Minister.
- August 28, 2025-is the deadline for AOPFN to provide initial feedback and AOPFN will also identify Indigenous-led projects that would fit within the 'Special Economic Zones' framework within our territory as well.



RECENT MEDIA HEADLINES:

- July 15, 2025 - nine First Nations in Ontario filed a constitutional challenge against the Provincial and Federal Governments, to kill parts of Bill 5 and Bill C-5.
 - Note that AOPFN is not part of the nine First Nations above, but AOPFN has been consulting with our Legal Team since both Bills were passed in June, to ensure that we are prepared to take legal action if necessary

CLOSING:





- AOPFN does not, and never has, claimed to speak for all Algonquins on this or any other matter and that we respect the rights of other Algonquin nations, Canada's duty to consult, and Canada's responsibility to uphold the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP) and Indigenous Rights to free, prior, and informed consent.
- Protection of the lands, waters and wildlife is always our top concern. The AOPFN will continue to inform proponents in respect to our Consultation & Engagement Protocols & Requirements in relation to projects in AOPFN's unceded Algonquin traditional territory.

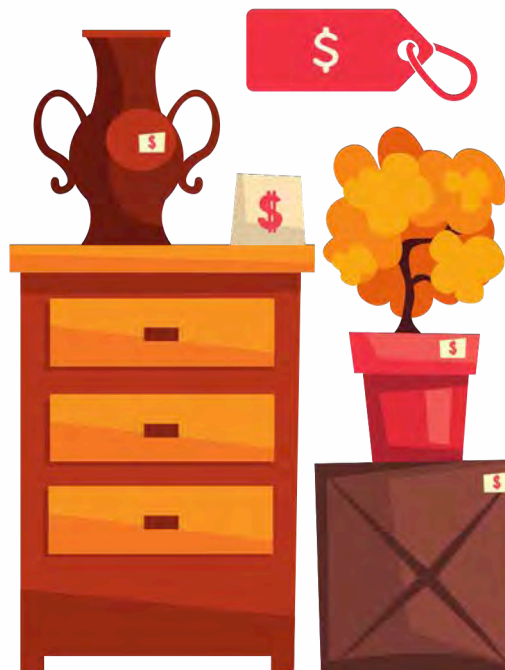

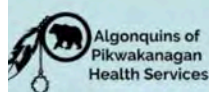

Re: Endorse the Development of a Code of Conduct for Human Trafficking Prevention in Niagara Region

This is to confirm that at the Aug 11, 2025 Council Meeting the following resolution was adopted with respect to the above noted matter:

WHEREAS human trafficking in Niagara is currently a persistent challenge impacting the hospitality and tourism sectors;

WHEREAS human trafficking is a critical issue due to the region's proximity to the U.S. border and the thriving tourism and hospitality sectors, which create environments where sexual and labour exploitation can go unnoticed;

WHEREAS women, newcomers, racially-marginalized people, people experiencing poverty, people living with disabilities, and children in the child welfare system are disproportionately targeted and impacted by the harms perpetuated by traffickers;

WHEREAS 60% of human trafficking cases in Ontario occur along the corridor linking Toronto and Niagara;

WHEREAS data from the Niagara Regional Police Service comparing 2023 to 2024 indicates the number of human trafficking investigations increased by 61%; the number of victims identified increased by 700%; the number of accused charged increased by 190%; the number of criminal charges laid increased by 75%; and the number of referrals from NRPS' Human Trafficking Unit to Victim Services Niagara increased by 133%;

WHEREAS human trafficking thrives in secrecy, but with leadership and commitment, local government can be on the front line of prevention and protection;

WHEREAS local businesses and organizations are key to preventing human trafficking through proactive measures such as The 4 Ps: prevention, protection, partnership, and prosecution;

WHEREAS local area municipalities have already begun to assist in making the Niagara region inhospitable to human traffickers;

WHEREAS Tools of Empowerment for Success (TOES) Niagara and Brock University have undertaken work funded by Women and Gender Equality Canada to develop a Code of Conduct to Prevent Human Trafficking in the Niagara Region through education, increasing awareness, and providing resources, including prevention strategies; and

WHEREAS TOES Niagara and Brock University created a Steering Committee of representatives from across tourism, business, education, law enforcement, government, and non-profit sectors to engage in broad community collaboration through focus groups, surveys, and feedback sessions to develop the Code of Conduct for Human Trafficking Prevention in the Niagara Region.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

1. That Township of West Lincoln **RECOGNIZE** that human trafficking in Niagara has serious impacts on the health and wellness of local residents and their families, as well as negative economic impacts on local businesses and communities;
2. That Township of West Lincoln **ENDORSE** the work of TOES Niagara and Brock University in developing a Code of Conduct for the Prevention of Human Trafficking in the Niagara Region;
3. That Township of West Lincoln **COMMIT** to reviewing and assessing the applicable local government sectoral guidelines and responsibilities outlined in The Code upon its finalization, with the intent to implement measures that align with Regional priorities and capacity;
4. That Township of West Lincoln **WRITE** letters to all of Niagara's 12

Local Area Municipalities encouraging them to also endorse the work of TOES Niagara and Brock University in the development of the Code of Conduct for the Prevention of Human Trafficking in the Niagara Region and commit to reviewing and assessing the applicable local government sectoral guidelines and responsibilities outlined in The Code upon its finalization, with the intent to implement measures that align with municipal priorities and capacity; and

5. That a copy of this motion **BE SENT** to Niagara's four MPs; Niagara's four MPPs; the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO); the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM); Mayors and Regional Chairs of Ontario (MARCO); Ontario's Big City Mayors (OBCM); and the Ontario and Canadian Associations of Chiefs of Police.



WHEREAS the Province of Ontario, through the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry, is planning to begin aerial spraying of glyphosate-based herbicides in late August 2025 in the Nipissing Forest; and

WHEREAS new scientific evidence published since Health Canada's last assessment of glyphosate in 2017 has linked glyphosate-based end-use products to cancer, metabolic and neurological diseases, reproductive toxicity, and ecosystem harm; and

WHEREAS the Province of Quebec banned the use of glyphosate for forestry purposes in 2001 and replaced aerial herbicide spraying with manual forest thinning as a safer alternative forest management method; and

WHEREAS many residents have expressed concern regarding the potential environmental and public health risks associated with aerial spraying of glyphosate-based herbicides;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Council of the Municipality of West Nipissing formally request that the Honourable Mike Harris Jr., Minister of Natural Resources and Forestry, reconsider the planned use of glyphosate-based herbicides in the Nipissing Forest and suspend the aerial spraying initiative until further independent research and updated risk assessments are completed and reviewed; and

WHEREAS under Ontario Regulation 391/21 :Blue Box producers are fully accountable and financially responsible for their products and packaging once they reach their end of life and are disposed of, for 'eligible' sources only;

AND WHEREAS 'ineligible' sources, which producers are not responsible for, include businesses, places of worship, daycares, campgrounds, public-facing and internal areas of municipal-owned buildings, and not-for-profit organizations, such as shelters and food banks;

AND WHEREAS failure to include 'ineligible sources under the Ontario Regulation 391/21:Blue Box program is in essence a provincial tax on ineligible sources;

AND WHEREAS should a municipality continue to provide services to the 'ineligible sources, the municipality will be required to oversee the collection, transportation, processing of the recycling, assuming 100% of the cost which amounts to yet another provincial municipal download;

Dear Premier Ford:

It has now been four months since the Municipality of Tweed submitted two detailed proposals for your consideration, both aimed at addressing pressing challenges facing small rural and northern communities. Despite our sincere efforts and outreach, we have yet to receive an acknowledgment or response from your office, your ministers, our local MPP, or the leaders of the opposition parties. This silence is deeply disheartening.

Please know that the Municipality of Tweed is grateful for your commitment to investing billions to protect Ontarians as promised in this year's provincial election. We look forward to the opportunity to capitalize on those investments.

The first proposal, sent directly to your office on March 25, 2025, addressed the *Repatriation of OPP Costs for Small Rural and Northern Communities During this Period of Uncertainty*. Our proposal suggested a temporary repatriation of OPP policing costs as a meaningful way to demonstrate that this government understands and supports the needs of small municipalities.

The proposal included two important conditions: first, that OPP costs be repatriated to the province during this time of economic instability and global uncertainty triggered by U.S. policies; second, that the municipalities benefiting from this relief reinvest those savings directly into community infrastructure projects. In Tweed's case, the annual savings of \$1.2 million would allow us to undertake long-overdue infrastructure upgrades that we simply cannot afford under the current burden of provincial policing costs.

The second proposal, submitted March 27, 2025, focused on *Supporting Small Rural and Northern Ontario Housing Developers* and aligns with your government's own priority to reduce barriers to housing development. This proposal was presented to Minister Surma, AMO President Robin Jones, and MPP Ric Bresee at the 2025 ROMA Conference. During our January 19, 2025 ROMA delegation, Minister Surma expressed interest and committed to raising it with then-Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing, Paul Calandra. We revisited the proposal with MPP Bresee during a March 13th meeting and have since

shared it with ROMA President Christa Lowry, Federal Minister of Housing and Infrastructure Minister Robertson, and Prime Minister Carney.

We have copied the leaders of Ontario's three main political parties on this letter, as we did when the proposals were originally submitted. We respectfully ask all parties—regardless of political affiliation to consider their merit and potential, and to speak to them in the Legislature. We are eager to work with any partner committed to helping rural and northern Ontario succeed.

Both proposals offered practical, shovel-ready ideas grounded in lived rural experience. And while we remain grateful for ongoing provincial support through the Ontario Municipal Partnership Fund (OMPF: \$2,058,700) and the Ontario Critical Infrastructure Fund (OCIF: \$340,000), it must be acknowledged that these funds are no longer sufficient to meet the growing financial and infrastructure burdens faced by communities like ours. To manage persistent shortfalls, Tweed Council has had to implement tax increases of 7.3% in 2023, 17.8% in 2024, and 15% in 2025. The burden this places on our residents is both significant and unsustainable.

Given that four months have passed without acknowledgment, I am resubmitting both proposals for renewed consideration. It is deeply concerning that when a small rural municipality—operating with limited resources and under significant financial strain—takes the initiative to present tangible and constructive solutions, those efforts are met with silence. We expect such outreach to be met with dialogue. The absence of even basic acknowledgment sends a troubling message: that rural and northern municipalities are to be seen but not heard. Furthermore, I have reached out to AMO and ROMA and unfortunately my faith in both organizations as effective advocates in this regard is waning.

As I have made clear to all parties, I remain more than willing to serve as an engaged and constructive member of any committee or working group convened to address the challenges before us. The situation is serious. Many of us are teetering on the brink. The time to act was yesterday.

I respectfully request your attention to this matter and look forward to your response.

Proposal to Repatriate OPP Costs for Small Rural and Northern Communities During this Period of Uncertainty

July 21, 2025 (Originally submitted March 25, 2025)

As Mayor of the Municipality of Tweed, I am representative of many small rural and northern Ontario communities that face growing financial pressures. Even in the best of times, we operate with limited resources, and now, the threat of President Trump's tariffs only intensifies our financial stress. Municipalities with populations of 10,000 or less are particularly vulnerable. We grapple with the same issues as larger cities—housing shortages, food insecurity, homelessness, healthcare concerns, inflation, and an overwhelming infrastructure funding deficit—but with far fewer financial resources and staffing capabilities. Unlike urban centres, which have access to additional funding streams and economies of scale, small rural and northern communities struggle to provide essential services with minimal support. Moreover, we are disproportionately affected by extreme weather events, further straining our already fragile infrastructure and emergency response capabilities. Without immediate and targeted assistance, many of our communities risk falling into economic and social decline.

With that in mind, we propose a temporary solution that would demonstrate your government's support for small rural and northern Ontario. Premier Ford, has stated that securing a strong majority was essential to investing billions in response to the Trump tariffs. Repatriating OPP policing costs for small rural and northern communities during this period of economic uncertainty would be a swift and impactful show of support. This initiative would immediately benefit 330 municipalities at a cost of less than \$600 million. In the context of multi-billion-dollar expenditures, a \$600 million investment is a meaningful way to show small municipalities that they matter.

This initiative could be structured with two key conditions: it would remain in place while Ontario remains vulnerable to economic pressures, and the funds saved by municipalities would be reinvested into critical infrastructure projects. For example, such a measure for the Municipality of Tweed would free up approximately \$1.2 million, allowing us to address urgent infrastructure needs and support our local economy.

We need all levels of government to recognize that small rural and northern municipalities are extremely vulnerable and now more than ever we need governments so show that they stand with small municipalities. We look forward to discussing our proposal with you.

Proposal to Support Small Rural and Northern Housing Developers

July 21, 2025 (Originally submitted March 27, 2025)

The Municipality of Tweed supports all efforts to remove barriers to housing development. To demonstrate our commitment, we have proactively revised our zoning bylaws to encourage housing densification and affordability. We now permit tiny homes (400–600 sq. ft.), smaller homes (900–1200 sq. ft.), mobile homes on rural lots, reduced lot sizes and setbacks, and fewer parking space requirements. Additionally, we do not impose development fees. These measures aim to diversify our housing stock, enhance affordability, and minimize environmental impact.

Our commitment to housing expansion is already delivering results. We are collaborating with builders to develop a 80-unit retirement community and a retirement home, complementing our existing 120-bed extended care facility. In 2024, the Municipality of Tweed led Hastings County in housing starts, issuing 122 building permits, including 38 new homes and a 25-unit geared-to-income apartment complex. Last year, we hosted a Developers Forum, where local developers presented subdivision plans that could bring over 600 new homes to our community within the next five years.

We made a \$4 million+ investment in our lagoon that will allow us to accommodate another 1500 homes. Our current well enhancements allow us to service an additional 750 homes. We are investigating future new water sources to allow us to reach our target of 1500 homes.

However, infrastructure costs for new subdivisions remain a significant barrier. Unlike large urban developers, small rural developers lack the financial backing of major investors and must independently finance subdivision infrastructure, making projects cost-prohibitive. There is a growing perception that federal and provincial housing investments are disproportionately focused on large urban centers, despite billions of dollars being allocated to housing initiatives.

Our proposal seeks financial assistance through interest-free loans for small rural and northern developers to cover infrastructure costs. These loans would be repaid as homes are sold, ensuring the government recoups its investment with the only cost being interest. Unlike current urban housing initiatives—where both principal and interest fall entirely on the province and federal government—this model ensures fiscal responsibility. Additionally, rather than the standard 25–30-year amortization period, our proposal anticipates repayment within five years, making it a practical and innovative solution to the housing crisis in small rural and northern communities.

The demand for housing in regions similar to ours remains strong. Seniors want to age in place, staying close to friends, family, and their established healthcare providers. When seniors relocate to urban centers, they leave behind a gap in healthcare continuity at a critical stage in their lives. Conversely, when seniors transition to retirement communities within rural areas, they free up existing housing stock for younger families. Additionally, the influx of urban retirees to rural communities has further driven demand which in turn increases the housing stock in those urban areas. Housing in small communities like Tweed can be built at a fraction of the cost compared to large urban centers, offering a cost-effective solution to Ontario's housing crisis. The Municipality of Tweed's absence of development fees provides yet another financial incentive for homebuyers and developers alike.

Premier Ford, we have answered your call for municipalities to facilitate housing growth. We urge you to give serious consideration to this proposal, recognizing Tweed as a model for how rural communities can be part of the solution to Ontario's housing crisis. We need all levels of government to recognize that small rural and northern municipalities are key to helping this country and province resolve our housing crisis. We look forward to discussing our proposal with you.

Subject: Request for Exemption to Proposed Mandatory Firefighter Certification Requirements (O. Reg. 343/22)

On behalf of the Council of the Township of Black River-Matheson, I am writing to express our concerns regarding the mandatory firefighter certification requirements under Ontario Regulation 343/22.

At its meeting held on June 10th, Council passed the attached resolution formally opposing the implementation of these requirements. While we recognize and support the importance of firefighter training and safety, the regulation as it stands does not adequately reflect the operational realities of small, rural, and northern municipalities.

Communities such as ours rely heavily on volunteer and composite fire departments that already face critical challenges in recruitment, training accessibility, and financial capacity.

Specifically, we are burdened by:

- Geographic barriers and long travel distances to accredited training centres,
- Inconsistent access to instructors and scheduling options,
- Limited budgets and competing capital demands,
- Difficulty in retaining and replacing volunteers due to increased regulatory pressures.

Without additional support, flexibility, or exemption mechanisms, the implementation of O. Reg. 343/22 will severely compromise our ability to provide consistent, timely, and effective fire protection to our residents.

Accordingly, the Council of the Township of Black River-Matheson respectfully requests that the Office of the Fire Marshal and the Ministry of the Solicitor General:

1. Defer full implementation of the certification regulation for rural and northern municipalities,
2. Provide exemptions or alternative compliance pathways tailored to the needs and limitations of small, remote fire services,
3. Increase funding and training supports for municipalities outside major urban centres.

We believe that a one-size-fits-all regulatory model will disproportionately and unfairly affect communities like ours. A more flexible, consultative approach is urgently needed. Thank you for your consideration of this request. We would welcome further discussion and are open to participating in any future consultations or working groups aimed at resolving these challenges collaboratively.

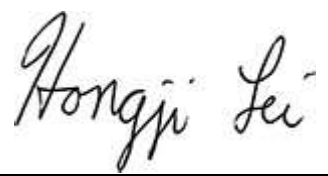

Be it resolved;

WHEREAS the Council of the Village of Burk's Falls, together with residents from surrounding municipalities, has expressed strong and united opposition to the proposed installation of a Battery Energy Storage System (BESS) facility, citing significant concerns regarding public safety, environmental risk, land use compatibility, and insufficient local economic benefit; and

WHEREAS the perceived risk associated with BESS installations significantly outweighs any demonstrated local advantage, and further, the lack of established, province-wide planning policies has led to avoidable conflict and uncertainty for municipalities and residents alike;

Now therefore be it resolved that:

1. The Council of the Village of Burk's Falls respectfully requests that the Province of Ontario immediately suspend the approval and development of all new BESS installations until a comprehensive, science-based study is completed. Such a study should result in the development of robust, province-wide policies and regulations governing the operation, and risk mitigation of BESS facilities.
2. The Province of Ontario be urged to provide clear policy guidance to municipalities and industry stakeholders recommending that BESS installations be permitted only on lands currently zoned for industrial use, recognizing that:
 - a) such lands have been previously evaluated and approved for industrial development; and
 - b) the limited economic return provided by BESS projects does not justify rezoning lands designated for other uses.


3. The Province of Ontario be further requested to disseminate the results of this study and any associated policy or regulatory recommendations to all Ontario municipalities, thereby preventing unnecessary and costly legal challenges, public opposition, and community division related to the siting of future BESS projects.
4. 

Re: Advocacy for Increased Income Support Thresholds for Canadian Veterans

At their Regular Meeting of Council on July 9, 2025, the Council of the Town of Aylmer passed the below resolution:

WHEREAS the Town of Aylmer recognizes the selfless service and enduring sacrifices made by Canadian Armed Forces veterans in the defence of our country and values;

WHEREAS the 2021 Census, conducted by Statistics Canada, identified more than 460,000 veterans residing across Canada, a significant population segment deserving of comprehensive, accessible, and modernized federal support;

WHEREAS Veterans Affairs Canada (VAC) currently administers income support programs to assist veterans in need, including the Income Replacement Benefit (IRB) program;

WHEREAS the eligibility threshold for the Income Replacement Benefit (IRB) program which was created in 2019 – set at \$20,000 annually for a single-person household – fails to reflect today's economic reality, particularly in light of inflation, soaring housing costs, and the general increase in cost of living;

WHEREAS such low eligibility thresholds may disincentivize employment and community participation by penalizing veterans for earning beyond an outdated benchmark, thereby discouraging reintegration and contribution to civic life;

WHEREAS it is the duty of all levels of government to stand in unified support of our veterans and to advocate for policy changes that enable them to live with dignity and financial stability;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED That the Council of the Town of Aylmer formally calls on the Government of Canada and all federal parties to increase the eligibility threshold for the Income Replacement Benefit (IRB) program from \$20,000 to no less than \$40,000 annually for a single-person household; and

THAT Council urges Veterans Affairs Canada to review all income support programs with the intent to modernize eligibility criteria in line with the current cost of living across Canada;
