


Dark Sky By-Law Recommendation

Protecting the Night Sky, Wildlife, and Community Wellbeing



Why Stronger Outdoor Lighting Regulations?

- Arnprior residents and our natural environment could benefit from stronger outdoor lighting regulation.
- O With amendments to the Sign and Merchandise By-Law Amendment and/ or a new lighting by-law, Arnprior and it's residents can continue to incorporate appropriate lighting that can be beautiful, healthy, and functional.
- Light pollution = human-made alteration of night lighting
- Arnprior sits at 5/9 on the Bortle Scale (moderately polluted skies)



Current Plans & By-Laws

Arnprior Official Plan:

E7.3.1.3 Lighting

- a) Exterior lighting of sites and buildings will be directed towards the ground and/or shielded, to the extent possible, to minimize light pollution in order to preserve a dark night sky.
- b) Illumination of street rights-of-way will be in a manner that minimizes light pollution and energy consumption, while providing a safe level of illumination onto the roadway and sidewalks.
- c) Human-scaled lighting will be provided in strategic areas with high levels of pedestrian activity, such as sidewalks along main streets, transit stops and stations, schools and other public buildings, and parks.
- d) Exterior lighting should not directly illuminate or cast significant shadows on adjacent buildings and especially window openings.

E5.2 Green Development Standards

- c) Ensure that green development standards include, but are not limited to, the following:
- iv. Requirements for Dark Sky compliant practices for exterior lighting;

Property Standards By-Law No.6602-16

2.3.4 All lighting used to illuminate a parking area, driveway, walkway or the exterior of a building shall be maintained in a safe, structurally-sound condition and in working order. All fixtures shall be installed so as to deflect the light away from adjacent properties.

Sign and Merchandise By-Law No. 5209-04

"Illuminated Sign" means a sign that provides artificial light directly or through any transparent or translucent material, from a source of light connected with such sign, or a sign illuminated by a light focused upon or chiefly directed at the surface of the sign.

Why It Matters

1. Wildlife and ecosystems

Plants and animals depend on Earth's daily cycle of light and dark to govern life-sustaining behaviors such as reproduction, nourishment, sleep, and protection from predators. Scientific evidence suggests that artificial light at night has negative and deadly effects on many creatures, including amphibians, birds, mammals, insects, and plants.

1. Energy and Climate

Lighting levels that are higher than necessary and light that shines when and where it's not needed adds an environmental and financial strain. DarkSky estimates that at least 30 percent of all outdoor lighting in the U.S. alone is wasted, mostly by lights that aren't shielded. That adds up to \$3.3 billion and the release of 21 million tons of carbon dioxide per year

1. Human Health

Studies have shown that exposure to artificial light at night negatively affects human health, including increased risk for: Sleep disorders, Depression, Obesity, Diabetes, Heart disease, and cancer.

Recommendations

- 1. Amend the Arnprior Signage and Merchandise Bylaw to address:
 - a. Lighting of Outdoor Advertising Signs, including billboards
 - i. Lighting must be mounted on top and facing down
 - ii. Use full cut-off fixtures
 - iii. Only using lighting with a correlated color temperature (CCT) of 3000 K and below
 - b. Consider management practices for all signage such as setbacks, curfews, size limits, and gradual brightness of electronic boards or signs with backlighting.

1. <u>Create a new Outdoor Lighting Bylaw</u> that provides better regulation for the Official Plans "E7.3.1.3 Lighting" and defines what the Dark Sky compliant practices are as mentioned in E5.2 Green Development Standards.

2.7 Lighting Of Outdoor Advertising Signs


Outdoor advertising signs, and light fixtures used to illuminate signs or billboards shall minimize light pollution by being mounted on top of the sign facing down, must utilize full cut-off fixtures and must be in compliance with other sections of this by-law. Examples below:

Full-Cut-Off Fixture (FCO) means a luminaire or light fixture that; by design of the housing, does not allow any light dispersion or direct glare to shine above a horizontal plane from the base of the fixture where light is emitted and limits the emission of light in the zone from 80-90-degrees from to less than 10% of the total light output from the luminaire, and must be installed in a horizontal position as designed. These fixtures produce very little glare or stray light due to the exposure of the bulb light source because the

source is recessed or shielded.

DarkSky has developed this document to provide planners, lighting designers, architects, biologists, government officials, and the general public with a basic understanding of the environmental hazards and potential solutions to making EMCs less obtrusive and more sustainable. This guidance is particularly well-suited for municipal planning.
